Let's "Get Connected, Stay Connected" at the SAASE Convention in Moosomin

All the sessions including the Consumer Protection Program will be held at the Moosomin Community Centre, located at 902 Birtle St. We will also have a registration desk set up at the Centre Friday at 8 am for those coming in Friday morning.

On Friday night the Moosomin and Fairmede Ag Societies have a great evening planned at the Community Centre. Enjoy a few cocktails, a great meal, and then a great social evening.

On Saturday, we will get into our

usual convention programming. We will have breakfast at the Country Squire Inn, then head over to the Community Centre for the day. We have some excellent sessions planned, and will be highlighting some of the great things that happened with our Ag Societies over the past year.

Cattle Producer Touts Marketing Tactics

A group of 32 Meadow Lake area producers had cash cows on their brain during an agricultural seminar Wednesday. Les Johnston, a livestock producer in Southwest Saskatchewan, talked about some ways to make more money marketing cattle.

“We have more power than we actually think we have...It’s time to do something to take that back,” he said. “We have to find some ways to put money back in our pockets.”

Johnston said keeping cows longer, so they put on more weight, will fetch more money at the auction. A local feedlot or packing plant would lower trucking costs and bypass stockyards.

He also advised producers to know their cost of production and to know their product—know the rate of gain, conversion, yield, and other details that will equip them for negotiations with packing plants.

Age verification also helps, as does carcass genetics. From an ultrasound you can determine weight, marbling, backfat, ribeye, the adjusted ribeye area according to weight, and the percentage of lean meat yield. This data can help producers build a profitable herd.

“Producers need to educate themselves. You can’t market something if you don’t know anything about it,” said Johnston.

Johnston also noted the importance of positioning and partnerships. If producers in an area run their own farms their own way, but use similar genetics (i.e. Simmental and Angus) and align their practices (i.e., breed, brand, and wean at the same time of year), they can book feedlot pens and trucks together. They can market together as well, if there’s a block of 50,000 to 60,000 lbs. that are similar.

Wednesday’s meeting was the latest in a series of

workshops around the province organised by the Saskatchewan Association of Agricultural Societies and Exhibitions (SAASE).

Also speaking at the seminar was Brenda Stefenson, a business-planning specialist with Sask. Agriculture and Food. She spoke about the government renewal programs available to producers, such as the Canadian Agricultural Skills Service program, and the Canadian Farm Business Advisory program.

“Right now with farming the way it is, it’s important farmers have access to something that can help them out”, she said.

Glen Duck, SAASE Executive Director, talked about his organisation’s programs, services and opportunities for community partnerships. “We’ve been around for a long time, but when you get outside the Ag Societies and Exhibitions, not a lot of people know who we are,” he said, noting SAASE started in 1986 and now has 62 Ag Societies in the province.

Murray Klassen, a mixed farmer Southwest of Meadow Lake, came to the meeting to hear what’s going on in the cattle industry. “Basically I wanted to hear where they feel the market is going, and where they feel the opportunities might be,” said Klassen. “Marketing most of the time is a guess. Hopefully you are right more than you are wrong.”

Linda Nadon, a rancher Southeast of town, found the meeting informative, but she was frustrated by the disruption caused by the parking meters along Centre Street. Throughout the meeting, which began at 10:30 am and continued to early afternoon, producers periodically had to go outside to put more change in the meters.

“It reflects poorly on our community. These people come to our community from far away to share their knowledge with us, and we keep leaping up to put quarters in the meters. Did this happen in other communities? No, but it happened in Meadow Lake,” she said. “This is stupid. Didn’t that experiment at Christmas tell them anything?”

Saskatchewan Fairs Industry Loses a Friend: Bob Baker

Bob was very active not only in his community, but also in the fair industry. He was a member and director of the Moose Jaw Exhibition, also serving as president on two separate occasions. He also

He was active in his community as he assisted with Canada day, Festival of Words, Prairie Arts Festival, and Moose Jaw’s Centennial Celebrations. Bob was also a committee member

of the Murals of Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan Air Show, and Parks and Recreation Advisory boards.

Bob was a director of Western Canada Fairs, and a past director of SAASE. His contribution to the Fair industry was great, and he will be missed.

CAFE Consumer Protection Workshop a Feature of SAASE Convention

Saskatchewan Agricultural Societies and Fairs will have a tremendous educational opportunity at this year's SAASE Convention in Moosomin.

The Canadian Association of Fairs and Exhibitions (C.A.F.E.), in partnership with SAASE, will be offering the Consumer Protection Program for Farm Animal Contact at Fairs, Exhibitions, and Shows Workshop to SAASE members.

The workshop, taking place Friday, March 16th at the Moosomin Community Centre, will be the only one presented in Saskatchewan this year. So it's very important for any organization with a livestock-associated event to attend.

Contamination from E. Coli and other pathogens has

become a significant risk to those organizations that bring humans and farm animals into contact. Recent lawsuits against fairs and fair operators have signalled an increasing and disturbing new trend in liability. The Consumer Protection Program for Farm Animal Contact at Fairs is designed to provide useful, interactive information and tools to enhance consumer protection at events that feature or promote human contact with farm animals.

C.A.F.E., in partnership with the International Association of Fairs and Expositions (I.A.F.E.), Technical Solutions International (T.S.I.), and SAASE will be delivering this program at the SAASE Convention.

The workshop will offer Ag Societies an in-depth look at E. Coli and other dangerous

pathogens, and teach organizers how to develop, write, and implement consumer protection plans for events featuring livestock.

Participants will take part in interactive discussions and learn how to develop site-specific tools to evaluate your facilities and to develop action plans to minimize the risks associated with pathogens. Make sure to bring maps of your buildings and grounds. Ag Societies and Exhibitions will leave with a "starter kit" for creating or enhancing consumer protection programs at their own facility.

More information will be provided in the Convention packages. However, any Ag Society or Exhibition involved with livestock would be wise to be sure they attend this year's Convention in Moosomin.

Changes to Canadian Western Agribition's 4-H Judging Program

Canadian Western Agribition has announced changes to Agribition's 4-H Judging Program. The key changes to the program include the following:

- » **New Name:** Canadian National 4-H & Youth Judging Competition.
- » **Eligible Competitors:** All 4-H clubs in Canada, and Canadian Colleges by invitation.
- » **Age of Competitors:** The eligible age of the competitors will remain 17-21 years of age as of January 1st of the year of the competition.
- » **New Format:** It is now a professional "Competition". There will be no seminars offered during this competition. Do your research at home and come prepared and well informed.
- » **Shorter Length:** The competition starts at 4:00 pm Sunday, November 18 and concludes after the Awards Luncheon on Tuesday, November 20. (Estimate time is 3:00 pm.) All competitors are required to attend all planned events in the program for their duration.

- » **Increased Number of Competitors:** Each province can send a maximum of 8 competitors and each College will be invited to send a maximum of 4 competitors. We would ask that all Provinces select 4 alternates. These alternatives may have the opportunity to compete if the Colleges or Provinces do not send the maximum competitors allotted to them.
- » **Chaperones:** The program will only accommodate one chaperone from each group of competitors.
- » **Change in Classes Judged:** There will be 10 livestock classes and 4 oral reasons classes.
- » **Changes in Reasons:** There will be no written reasons. You will have to give oral reasons on 4 predetermined classes.
- » **Awards:** There will be significant improvement to prizes awarded. The Grand Aggregate winner will receive an expense paid trip to the Expointer Show, August 23-30, 2008 in Esteio, Brazil. 2nd place winner will receive a \$1,250 scholarship from John Deere

- Limited, 3rd place winner will receive a \$750 scholarship from John Deere Limited, 4th and 5th will receive cash.
- » **Dress Code:** There will be a dress code in effect. Males are required to wear a shirt and tie, along with appropriate pants. Females are required to wear a shirt with collar and long sleeves, along with appropriate slacks.
- » **Fees Adjusted:** The registration fees will increase to \$159 for each competitor and \$79.50 for each chaperone. (includes GST) All expenses will still be paid for by the competition from 4:00 Sunday, November 18, 2007 through to the end of the Awards Luncheon on Tuesday, November 20.
- » **Participation:** Any competitor may compete in this competition more than once, as long as they have not won as Grand Aggregate in any previous year.
- » **Deadline for Forms:** Registration forms must be to the 4-H office or College by August 31, 2007. The offices must have the forms to Canadian Western Agribition by September 15, 2007.

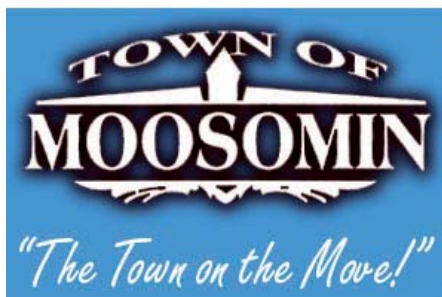
The two day conference was packed full of information for farmers and ranchers. From topics on “Improving profitability
