





# Changes Being Made to Venture Project Program for 2019


The Venture Project program has been one of the cornerstones of SAASE's provincial programming. One of the big challenges in starting a new event for Agricultural Societies is the risk of financial loss on that event. The Venture Project program was set up to help out the development of a new event or the enhancement of an existing event by supplying seed money to get the project going. There are countless events that have been helped out with the seed money that have been tremendously successful and continue to operate as stand alone events today.

There have been few changes to the program since its inception almost 20 years ago and the SAASE Board



of Directors felt it was time to make some changes to the program. An additional challenge that new events have – that the SAASE Board of Directors wanted to address – was that it is sometimes hard to evaluate an event after just one year. If events were funded for more than 1 year it would relieve additional pressure on the Agricultural Society going forward.

results of the previous year. There will be one deadline for applications – December 1. Applications will be approved on merit and qualifications and funded within the limits of the funds available for Venture Projects. Applications received after the deadline will be evaluated on a first come first served basis and will be funded based on any funds remaining from the December 1st deadline.



Projects under the new program may be eligible for funding of up to 3 years. Funding for the first year would be eligible for up to 50% of eligible expenses – 35% of eligible expenses for the second year – 15% of eligible expenses for the third year. The maximum amount of support would be \$10,000 per application.

If applying for more than 1 year for the same project, SAASE would require an additional application each year, with a financial statement showing the

**3 Year Project Requests:**

For the initial application – the Agricultural Society will submit a 3 year budget with the projected income and expenses. In year 2 and 3 of the applications – after the event has taken place – the Agricultural Society will complete the year 2 and 3 applications, which include submitting the budget with actual numbers versus



the budgeted numbers with an explanation on the variance, as well as including any changes that will be made in the project going forward to improve the event.

Upon completion of the project, a report must be submitted. This report will include an evaluation of how well the project achieved the stated objectives, any deviation from the original plan and should be accompanied by a financial statement of the project. Payment will be made within thirty days to the maximum approved in the application. SAASE will pay out a total of 75% of the approved amount, with the additional 25% being paid out once a presentation has been made at the SAASE Annual convention.

These are some pretty major changes to the program and there will no doubt be some growing pains as we go forward. Applications and the application guide have been sent out to all the Agricultural Society Presidents and Secretaries, with the new forms being available on the website. If you have any questions or ideas for a new project - talk to Glen at the SAASE office.



## SAASE Makes POS Machine Available to Members

One of the challenges that face SAASE's Agricultural Societies that have 1 or 2 day events, is making it easier for our patrons to be able to pay using credit at the event. For the Agricultural Society to purchase a POS machine for those couple of days in many cases did not make sense. The SAASE Board of Directors explored the idea of SAASE purchasing a POS machine and making it available to SAASE's members for their events.

As a result, SAASE is making a POS machine available for our members events. The POS machine would be on loan for that event, with the money that is generated going into a separate account. The Agricultural Society would receive a check from SAASE after the event for the total less any fees. The system is currently being set up and will be ready for events taking place this summer. # 2018 Provincial Safety Day Program

Many in agriculture know someone whose life has been affected by a farm-related injury or death. The statistics are sobering. Even more tragic is that these incidents could have been prevented with a few simple safety precautions. With this in mind the Saskatchewan Association of Agricultural Societies and Exhibitions (SAASE) and the Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture have partnered on a Provincial Safety Day Program over the past seven years. SAASE's expertise in providing provincial programming, as well as Saskatchewan's network of Agricultural Societies experience in working with youth and community groups and management of many of Saskatchewan's facilities, made SAASE and its members the natural choice to deliver the program.



The strength of any program of this scope is the quality of organizations delivering the program, as well as the partnerships that are developed both provincially and locally. In addition to the Ministry of Agriculture, SAASE has developed partnerships with national and international groups devoted to keeping our youth safe - the Progressive Agriculture Foundation and the Canadian Agricultural Safety Association. Saskatchewan's Agricultural Societies have some of the most devoted, committed, and community minded volunteers in Canada, and this partnership has allowed SAASE to train those volunteers across the province to deliver safety days. With the training, education and resources supplied by the Progressive Agriculture Foundation and CASA, SAASE has developed a provincial network of volunteers dedicated to teaching Saskatchewan's youth about safety. The additional funding partnership

that SAASE has developed with the Community Initiatives Fund (CIF) has allowed our volunteers to attend the Safety Day coordinators workshop at no cost to them.

From 2015 - 2018 – 51 safety days were hosted by Saskatchewan's Agricultural Societies, with over 15,000 students from 75 communities attending. Each year 500 volunteers donate over 5,000 hours of their time to teach our children about safety.

These safety days would not be possible without the support of our other provincial partners. The Community Initiatives Fund (CIF), SaskPower, CN, Farm Credit Canada, Prairie South School Division, Viterra, Enbridge and the Saskatchewan Safety Council have all joined SAASE provincially to help out as partners. These provincial partners are in addition to the many local partners who help our Agricultural Societies out with hosting the safety days. SAASE and all of our partners look forward to 2018 when 19 safety days will be hosted and

over 5,000 of Saskatchewan's children will learn about safety. The tentative schedule for 2018 is as follows.
