## Clark and Anne Lewis Scholarship Winners Announced

The Saskatchewan Association of Agricultural Societies and Exhibitions has chosen this year's recipients of the Clark and Anne Lewis Scholarship. The 2009 winners are Brandon Wilson and Brooklyn Lemon. Brandon was nominated by the Creelman Agricultural Society, and Brooklyn was nominated by the Maryfield Agricultural Society. This is the fourth year for the scholarship, and as usual the selection committee had a very difficult task in choosing the winners, because of the outstanding applications that were received.

### Brandon Wilson

Brandon Wilson was nominated by the Creelman Agricultural Society. He is 18 years old and has graduated from the "33" Central School in Fillmore. He lives in Creelman and has attended the school in Fillmore from Kindergarten right through to grade 12.

Brandon has been very involved not only with the Village of Creelman, but also the Creelman Ag. Society. Over the past 5 years he has been volunteering for the Creelman community dinner theatre, and over the years has convinced his entire basketball team to help out. The cemetery is mowed and maintained entirely by volunteers and Brandon has also helped out there, as well as volunteering in the maintenance of the park.

Brandon participates yearly in the Terry Fox run in Creelman, as well as being active in the Remembrance Day services and essay competitions. He has helped out with the Creelman fair over the last



few years. This has included helping out in the barns, working to get the grounds ready, as well as helping set up the Beach Volleyball site.

Brandon not only is heavily involved with his community, but he is also involved in numerous extracurricular activities at his school. He participates in all the sports that are available, and as a result has been on the volleyball, basketball, badminton and curling teams. He was captain of the basketball and volleyball teams, and was skip for the junior boys curling team that won the District Championships. He has volunteered at many junior tournaments, by helping out with officiating, timekeeping as well as doing the lines. In his grade 12 year he coached the junior boys basketball team.

In 2004 he was selected as a member of the Zone One boys basketball team for the Saskatchewan Summer Games.

Even with all his community, Ag. Society and extracurricular activities, Brandon has still been able to maintain an average of at least 85% throughout his school years. Brandon has been accepted and by the University of Saskatchewan into first year Engineering. Trent Berling - Principal of the "33" Central School in Fillmore - has this to say about Brandon - "In our school community of Fillmore we are blessed with many individuals of sterling character. In my opinion Brandon raises the bar, even for the best of them." SAASE is very proud to add Brandon Wilson to our list of Clark and Anne Lewis Scholarship winners.

## Brooklyn Lemon

Brooklyn Lemon is the second recipient of the Clark and Anne Lewis scholarship for 2009. Brooklyn was nominated by the Maryfield Agricultural Society. Brooklyn is very well known throughout her community. She eagerly helps out with many community events. As well as exhibiting at the Maryfield fair she has also helped out by volunteering at the fair. Brooklyn is a leader in the sport of curling and has used her personal success to help out the community.

Even though Brooklyn is a very rounded individual with many interests and activities her big love is for curling. This past year she skipped her high school team to become provincial champions. Her junior womens team also won the provincials and then went on to compete at the Canadian National Junior Womens Championship. She has taken her success and used that to help out others. She started and organized a Kid's curling program in 2007, and has continued to run the program in 2008 and 2009. Her goal is to encourage young people to be

involved in curling and to make sure that curling stays active within her community. Cindy Thompson from the Maryfield Rec Board has this to say about Brooklyn - "Brooklyn has single-handedly recreated interest in our local youth for curling by hosting a clinic after school 2 days a week during the winter months to teach any child the fundamentals of the sport." - she continues - "Brooklyn has a calmness that makes her a great teacher. She has had a lot of success and is very modest about it. As a Rec Board, we owe Brooklyn the credit for 2 youth spiels held this year. She will be the reason our rink continues on, as we now have a large number of youth interested in the sport of curling." She has done all this while also curling with a team out of Regina.

She has also been very active in other school activities. Brooklyn has been a member of the Maryfield Students Council and was vice president in 2007 and president in 2008. In addition to curling she has also participated in volleyball, badminton and track and field. She has been assistant coach for the junior girls volleyball team. She has been very active in the school's public speaking competitions. She has been involved since grade 7 and was the winner in her age category in 2007 and 2009. Brooklyn has also had major roles in musical productions over the last number of years. This past year her Remembrance Day essay was the winning entry for the Province of Saskatchewan.

As if this isn't enough Brooklyn has also found time to work for the Village of Maryfield, a local restaurant, as well as this year working for a dentist in Moosomin. She also helps out at the family farm by assisting with sorting, tagging and feeding cattle, driving machinery, and helping out with the yard work.

Brooklyn has been accepted at the

University of Regina this fall and will be working towards a degree in Human Justice. She would like to eventually work in the R.C.M.P.

Finally Barbara Swallow - Principal of the Maryfield School had this to say about Brooklyn - "The leadership she shows in her daily approach to life whether it be in the classroom, in a club, or in a sports venue, will bring Brooklyn success in her future endeavors. I commend her for her commitment to youth, as well as for the enthusiasm and determination which she approaches everything she does. She will be one of our future leaders." SAASE is proud to name Brooklyn as our other Clark and Anne Lewis scholarship recipients.

All of the individuals who were nominated for the Clark and Anne Lewis scholarship deserve congratulations. They all exhibit the high ideals for which Clark and Anne would have been proud. With the tremendous number of great young people in our province we know there is great leadership for Saskatchewan in the future.




# AG-EXperience Tours the Province

The SAASE AG-EXperience provincial display has been very busy making the rounds to Saskatchewan fairs and Ag. Societies this summer. To date the display has been in 12 different locations around the province including - Prince Albert, Biggar, Lloydminster, Alameda, Moose Jaw, Swift Current, Turtleford, Battlefords, Glenavon, Melfort, Perdue and Ogema. There are 2 more stops to make on this years tour - in Unity and Melville.

The display has been very well recieved in all the locations it has been in and has been seen by thousands around the province. The real advantage is that it is very easy to set up, and for the most part Ag. Societies have been using students or teachers from the local school to man the display.

The display currently has 4 separate modules. There is beef, dairy, poultry and pork. Along with the signage the display comes with laptop computers that have the interactive games for each station. The display also comes with a hosting guide, coloring/activity books, as well as a teachers guide. There are 3 sets of the 4 modules. The space available and number of people expected to go through the display will determine how many of the sets the Ag. Society would need.

Saskatoon Prairieland Park has made available the copy of the signage, as well as the interactive games that have been instrumental in getting the program up and running. The Ag. Council of Saskatchewan, as well as Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada have helped out with the funding.



This past year Prairieland Park has been working on a new module for the AG-EXperience and unveiled it at the recent Saskatoon Exhibition. The module is a seeds and grains module, and SAASE helped out with some of the funding through the Venture Project Program for the new module.

SAASE is currently working on adding the new module to the AG-EXperience Provincial display. The hope is to have the new module ready for the spring of next year. Along with Prairieland Park SAASE is also looking for other partners to assist in the funding for the new module.

The program is very exciting and all Ag. Societies are encouraged to book the display for their event. Here is the Saskatchewan Team that will be competing at Agribition:



# Swift Current Southwest MarketPlace

Southwest MarketPlace 2009 was a Venture Project put together by the Swift Current Exhibition. The objective was to connect the local consumer with the local producers and create exposure and new markets for those in the region whose service area may currently be limited. Ultimately the goal was to have consumers in the Southwest support small businesses and producers in the Southwest region.

Project partners for Southwest MarketPlace 2009 included the Swift Current Exhibition, Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture, SAASE, Southwest Enterprise Region and Swift Current Tourism.

The Southwest MarketPlace was held at the Swift Current Ag. and Ex Frontier Days from June 25th - 28th in the Stockade Building. The project was put together fairly quickly so there



were some merchants and producers who were unable to make the show. There were a total of 22 business and producers who registered. The show offered flexibility with a variation of full and half days meaning that the booths/tables changed by the half day. Businesses attending included art, jewellery, Saskatoon berries, alpaca products, authors, photographers, remote helicopters, wind turbines, handmade quilts, as well as other local producers. The feedback that was received was very positive and that this was an excellent event. Southwest MarketPlace will certainly be included and expanded for 2010. If your Ag. Seniors welcomed visitors who registered and reminisced about old times over coffee and snacks. Saturday morning commenced with the annual pancake breakfast in the CPR Park organized by members of the Deep South Pioneer Museum. The horse show got an early start at eight o'clock and events were well attended during the day. This year the horse show and barrel races were under a new and younger committee and the Society recognizes their efforts and work for a great show with many participants. The parade started from the east side of Ogema, commenced down railway avenue to Main Street where crowds of people cheered and the children scurried for candies that were thrown by the various floats and dignitaries. The exhibits opened at 11:00 a.m. with over 1300 exhibits to look at with over 400 people taking time out of their busy lives to put their entries into our fair. Along with the many exhibits there were six vendors and four displays which included the SASSE AG-EXperience. This display was visited by many young people and from reports received was well received and educational especially our new residents from the Philippine Islands.

At the official opening of the 95th summer fair, president. Myrna Owen welcomed our guest dignitaries as well as our nine Century Farm Awards. Arlene Johnson-Noga was welcomed back to Ogema as she presented

During the events of the day; a number of School reunions were taking place and the Deep South Red Coat Road & Rail held their tenth anniversary celebrations in the CPR Park. Many of the Government officials that were instrumental in the founding of the Red Coat Road and Rail, were present for this the anniversary celebration. This is the result of another project undertaken by the people of this community as well as the surrounding communities.

During the day old time music entertained the many people who took advantage of sitting for a time of reminiscing and enjoyed the anniversary cake. The day ended with a cabaret inside the complex.

# SAASE Welcomes Lancer as New Ag. Society

At the latest meeting of the SAASE Board of Directors an application for a new Agricultural Society in Lancer was approved. The Village of Lancer is located on Highway #32, close to the Great Sandhills and in the heart of the Canada Goose flyway - 103 kms northwest of Swift Current. Lancer

has a total population of 60 people.

The major event of the Lancer Agricultural Society is the Annual Chokecherry Festival. The festival is held every year on the Thanksgiving Weekend and began in the Homecoming year of 1971. This year's festival is the 39th and is being held from Friday October 9 - Sunday, October 11. The Chokecherry Festival is an activity-packed family weekend which highlights the area's cultural and agricultural background. The money that has been generated from the festival was initially used to help build the 600 seat Community Hall, and since then has been used to upgrade and maintain it. Money that is generated from the festival this year will go towards replacing both the furnaces, as well as putting metal cladding on the roof.






# SAASE Welcomes Back the Kennedy Ag. Society

To continue with the many exciting things happening in the province and with SAASE - SAASE is proud to welcome back the Kennedy Agricultural Society as a member. Kennedy has run the Moose Mountain Pro Rodeo for the past 77 years, but has not been a member of SAASE since 2001. Kennedy made some changes and added a fair component to their rodeo and requested that their membership be renewed. New members and the welcoming back of old ones will make SAASE a much more dynamic organization. With the changes that were made as well as the addition of new events this year's Rodeo and Fair weekend were a tremendous success. ## Moose Mountain Rodeo Stirs Up Community Spirit and a Side of Homemade Pie

For the last 77 years, the annual Moose Mountain Rodeo has been an integral part of the community for the folks of Kennedy, Sask. and area, and this year is no different. "This year, all our proceeds from the rodeo are going into a couple of different projects within the community. We've got some rink repairs that need to happen for the roof, and we also have a health foundation that's trying to raise money for the new hospital that's going up," says Howard Floyd, president of the Moose Mountain Pro Rodeo and Fair Association.

"Over the past six years, I think we've given in excess of \$20,000 to the health foundation. For a community of 300 people, I'm pretty proud of what we've accomplished," he says. Floyd is on the committee of eight that volunteer throughout the year to make the two-day rodeo happen and says that, in addition to the contributions to the



community at large, they've also made a few improvements to the rodeo grounds, something they strive to do every year to make everything that much better for stock, contestants and fans.

"We're doing some restructuring of some of our back pens so that we've got better facilities for the timed event cattle. We had a bunch of bleachers that needed repair, and we've done some general painting and tidying up," he explains. On average, 1,800 to 2,200 visitors visit Kennedy over rodeo weekend, which runs July 18 and 19.

"We put on as good a show as you're going to find anywhere. And it's an entire family weekend. You can bring your entire family to it and they can participate

in everything that's going on in a relaxed atmosphere and have a good time," Floyd encourages would-be spectators and rodeo fans. "There are two demolition derbies and two rodeo performances," he says, adding, "and this year we have brought back our old-time fair, so we've got people that are entering crafts, displays and baked goods that are going to be judged. "I'm still trying to get on that committee," he laughs when asked if he gets to judge some of the pies that are entered. For those that aren't on the baked goods judge's panel, Saturday kicks off with a free pancake breakfast.
