Mortlach School has held a Fall Fair each September since 1989. In an effort to bring school and community together, it was expanded to include entries from both school children and the community. With the SAASE and Tourism Saskatchewan Venture Project Fund and under Glen Duck's guidance we got the project planned and organized.

The school gymnasium was transformed into a display area for the entries which started to arrive at the school early in the morning. Adult categories included: flowers, grains, garden produce, canning, baking, sewing, quilting, crocheting, knitting handicrafts, art work and photography. Children categories included: creative arts, artwork, baking, handicrafts, vegetables, and photography.

The judges were local volunteers who inspected, tasted, smelled, measured, checked articles for details, and determined the winners. They worked diligently and had decisions made by lunch time.

Joan Searle, the Mortlach Museum Curator, set up a display about previous community fairs. Her research has shown that Mortlach Agricultural Society was active in 1909. The 15th Annual Exhibition was held July 25, 1923. Mortlach Agricultural Society's 18th Annual Fair was held July 21, 1926 with \$2,000.00 in prizes being awarded! Admission to the fairgrounds was fifty cents. Mortlach's

last fair, Wheatlands Agricultural Fair, was held July 1991; the theme for this fair was "Happy Days are Here Again".

During the afternoon, the Fall Fair was open to visitors to view the entries. Students with their classroom teachers stopped by as did folks from the community. Everyone was excited to look for red ribbons!! There was also a table of garden produce for sale that people had donated – many folks purchased vegetables for their family's meals.


A beef-on-the-bun supper was held at the Mortlach Hall with proceeds going to support next year's Fall Fair. The committee was very thankful to the

September 27-29, 2013 with the Swift Current Agricultural and Exhibition Association hosting the 'Young Ranchman's All Breeds Youth Livestock Show'. Being held in conjunction with the 'Ranchman's Ridin' and Recitin', Young Ranchman's added a youthful flare to a weekend steeped with old West traditions. The Beef Pen Show, Heavy Horse Pull, Stock Dog Trials and the Ranch Horse Competitions were a good mix of activities for all ages and interests to enjoy. Hooves and Feathers Show and Sale along with the Cowboy Poetry made for a fun filled weekend.

The Young Ranchman's Show is an event open to all youth 21 years of age and under. After many months of planning, 108 young Agricultural enthusiast gathered together for three days of not only livestock events, but also Public Speaking, Art, Photography, Team Show Judging and most importantly networking and team building. The overwhelming response to this show confirmed the need to provide an event that encourages our provincial

Thirty public speakers filled a board room waiting for their turn to present a speech. Topics ranged from 'Scuba Diving', 'Driving across the USA to the Denver Stock Show' to 'Swimming with the Dolphins' and 'Raising a Million Cats'. Some participants were seasoned speakers and others first time participants. The poise and confidence of the youth involved certainly impressed the panel of judges. Judges were teachers, Aldermen, ranchers and toastmasters - all individuals who have practiced public speaking within their professions. They noted the importance of this skill to the juniors, applauding them for a job well done and encouraging the group to keep excelling with this life

Along with promoting youth to be responsible for livestock and to work alongside one another, this week-end offered help to those who were in need of a little extra expertise. This show was not just a cattle show for exhibiting livestock; a minimum of 2 'Skills competitions'

had to be entered. Judging, showmanship, grooming, public speaking and art and photography were part of this year's skills category. Being that this was our first year, we wanted the youth that have never attended a show like this to have a good experience entering classes that were somewhat familiar.

Photos with a 'Beef Cattle Influence' theme were judged and displayed, as well as: pencil sketches, paintings, Modge Podge Skulls and jewellery boxes, Lego art, stall signs and hand drawn posters. All were an excellent exhibition of the young people's talents. Plans for next year are to include marketing and literature,



as the intention is to include a few new additions every year.

Friday night was an evening to get acquainted and have some fun after a feed of Pizza and Pop! Although it was in a mixer format, a lot of questions were asked about the agricultural industry to create a quiz bowl competition. Along with this, the marshmallow toss and other games, teams used strategies to get the Oreo cookie that was stuck to one team members face moved down to their mouth. You can imagine the excitement that caused! We ended the evening with a fun old fashion game of musical chairs.

Saturday morning would come very early for those who were involved in the show team judging competition. After instruction on the formalities; exhibitors worked in pairs to judge a class of bred yearling heifers and fill out a judging card in the preliminaries.

Twenty-three teams of 46 participants competed, most had no prior experience or knowledge of this type of competition. At the end of the day three senior teams and three junior teams made their way to the show ring 'one duo' at a time. One person took on the role of judge while the other was the ring man. Reasons given to the crowd on a microphone were well presented.

At the end of the competition the top two senior teams and two junior teams were announced. It was interesting to receive the feedback we had on this competition as many pairs were already planning their





strategy for next year.

Because we followed their criteria and met all the requirements, we are the first Saskatchewan-based youth livestock show that qualifies youth to move on to compete at the Canadian National Young Cattleman of the Year Program. Chase Miller, Cody LaFrentz, Sadie Anwender and Georgia Pawlitza will advance and our show team judging winners will go to the Western Canada Show Team Judging Finals in Bashaw, Alberta. Senior show teams of Chase Miller & Cody LaFrentz, and Julia Pawlitza & Cheyenne Catley along with our junior teams of Sadie Anwender & Garrett Liebreich and Kyle Wall & Shane Hanel will be off to Bashaw in 2014!

The little Rancher program had 41 registered youth 8 years old and under. This program was geared to provide age appropriate information about the agricultural industry and safety, along with games, arts and craft and lots of snacks!

At the end of the day, this group of enthusiastic participants made their way to the show ring to wait for their turn to tell the crowd a few things about themselves using the micro-phone. Most were very eager to participate in this while others needed a little prompting. Whether they realized this or not, it was a fun way to introduce these Little Ranchers to public

speaking and in the future, show team judging

This program may have been the most important part to start to introduce youth to today's Agricultural Industry. We expect this portion of the Young Ranchman's show to grow quickly with both rural and urban participation. Perhaps this is the key to have a better understanding of the Agriculture Industry. In today's world of social media, it is our industry's responsibility to provide age appropriate factual information.

The banquet Saturday night was attended by 300 people. Sponsors were acknowledged for their commitment to the show and the daily award winners were asked to come to the front of the room for applause for their success in the skill competitions that day. Our guest speaker for the night was Robert Dixon. He was born and raised in Vermilion on a mixed farming operation. Robert runs a small herd of purebred Shorthorn cattle that are shown and sold across North America. He manages and markets his herd through distinctly contemporary venues, such as online sales and multi-media marketing campaigns.

Robert is a graduate of the Agribusiness Diploma program at Lakeland College. He now instructs at the college in the Agribusiness program. Among the courses

he teaches is Agricultural communications, Business Management, Livestock Genetics, Public Relations and Event Management and Livestock Marketing. Before coming to the college, Robert worked for the United Farmers of Alberta (UFA) in public relations/ communications and as a business analyst. He also serves as the chairman of the board for Green Hectares, a non-profit agricultural organization. He was also recognized this year as one of Alberta's 'rising stars' as one of 'The Next 10'. In his spare time, Robert enjoys traveling and riding horses. He travels to all the major livestock exhibits

and shows throughout North America connecting with producers, businesses and organizations. Robert enjoys speaking at agricultural events, and particularly to youth involved in agriculture. He is passionate and dedicated to connecting people to agriculture.



Record Crowds Attend Saskatchewan Equine Expo

In excess of 10,000 horse enthusiasts passed through the doors at Saskatoon Prairieland Park for the second annual Saskatchewan Equine Expoin Saskatoon, February 15-17, 2013. The three-day event presented in partnership with the WCVM and the SHF, featured educational seminars presented by the Western College of Veterinary Medicine, clinician Paul Dufresne, 11 breeds on display, an industry trade show, demonstrations by the Saskatchewan Hunter Jumper Association, the Alberta Donkey and Mule Association, Trainers Challenge, Friday and Saturday evening Equine Extravaganza that thrilled a standing room only audience. New to



the event this year was Canada's Ultimate Cowhorse competition where participants from across the provinces showcased their best horses in three components for the Champion buckle and prize money.

The Trainer's Challenge, sponsored by NAERIC, showcased the talents of three outstanding horse trainers; Dale Clearwater from Hanley, Saskatchewan, Clint Christianson from Bracken, Saskatchewan and Jesse Lussier from Ste. Rose du Lac, Manitoba. All three amazing horseman thrilled the crowd during each session with their individual skills. At the end of the event, hometown favorite Dale Clearwater was awarded the Championship title for the second year in a row.

A clinic presented by Paul Dufresne from Pritchard, B.C. was a big hit with spectators and pre-registered participants alike. Paul also presented exhibition performances at the Extravaganzas on Friday and Saturday nights. The industry trade show, once again exceeded expectations with vendors indicating they will be back next year. Expanding the trade show space by an additional 13,000 square feet, was much appreciated indicated Prairieland Park Agriculture Manager, Lori Cates.

A show highlight was the Equine Extravaganza held two evenings, both Friday and Saturday. The crowd that gathered in the Prairieland Park Ag Centre was overwhelming and adding the additional evening performance enabled more

spectators the ability to witness the shows. The event demonstrated the diversity of different horse breeds and disciplines. Discover the Farm: A Farm Facts Experience Swift Current Poultry & Exotic Animal Sale

The Second Annual Swift Current 'Discover the Farm: A Farm Facts Experience, and Poultry and Exotic Animal' sale occured on April 19th, and 20th of 2013. Invitations were sent out to all Swift Current and Southwest area schools to attend this event. Educational materials were provided by various organizations which are associated with Saskatchewan Agicultural industries including the Swift Current Ag & Ex, the provincial program Ag in Classroom, and SAASE.

The goal of this project was to invite various agricultural groups, particularly the exotic chickens, birds and other specialty animals raised



by local breeders into one site for school students and the public to learn, observe, and interact. Presentations for the students included exotic birds and animals, beef, dairy cows, poultry, crop growing and care, safety, Saskatchewan Agriculture in the Classroom, and SAASE provided interactive computer programs. The new areas added this year were the Agrium Seed Trailer, safety topics that included those of equipment safety, power safety, ATV safety and First Aid provided by local presenters from SaskPower, St. John Ambulance, and the RCMP.

This project was important for several reasons.

1. "Discover the Farm School Tour": displays set up with presenters that provided information. The majority of participants were from Grades 1 through to grade 6 although we also had Special Education students from the Comprehensive High School and up to Grade 8 from the Hutterite schools. Interactive groups were set up to visit each of the 12 different stations during the two hours set aside for the school tours. Presenters gave introductions and functional understandings of basic agricultural and safety principles. The computers that were set-up brought forward important introductory and factual curriculum suitable for the age groups of the students - primarily about Poultry, Beef, Pork, and Dairy.

Each of the 24 groups (12 in the morning, 12 in the afternoon) were also provided with time to visit animals and birds, and take a class photo by the 'barn', and search for a class prize in the 'needle in a haystack' (a small farm animal with seed packs hidden in shredded paper). A total of 98 students participated the first year. This, the second year of the event, over 400 participated.

- 2. Various exotic breeders had a place to come together. They were able to offer their animals and birds to the public in one venue. An opportunity was offered to families for gathering and discovering what is available agriculturally in the Swift Current area.
- 3. Interactive hands-on experiences were provided for all ages both days. Students on Friday, the public on Saturday. They were invited to intermingle with a variety exotic birds (chickens, chicks, roosters, geese, etc.) and animals (donkeys, alpaca, rabbits, miniature cows etc.) as well as actually milk a 'life-like' dairy cow, and given the opportunity to grow their own sunflower.

4. The various Swift Current and surrounding areas (including some from southern Alberta) producers' products were made readily accessible

to the public. Many were interested in buying, making contacts, and gathering information. All of this was made available in one venue: the Stockade Building at Kinetic Exhibition Park.

This project provided learning and working environment connecting the Southwest area rural producers. Public interest was strong: the community was offered the opportunity to observe and learn about the growing agricultural and ranching community. This was the second annual event to take place in Swift Current, and the feedback received was very positive with 100% reporting that they will return. Exhibitors, producers, and presenters from various organizations were impressed with the growing educational interest regarding agriculture, ranching and and the added sessions on safety. All responses proved the event is worthy of continuing and expanding for 2014.


Vanscoy Celebrates an Anniversary
