

Canadian Extreme Bulls and Bikes a Big Success in Year 2



The Lloydminster Exhibition has just finished up the second year of the 3 year Canadian Extreme Bulls and Bikes program - below is an article submitted by the Lloydminster Exhibition on this year's event.

The Lloydminster Agricultural Exhibition Association (LAEA) was approached by 2 prominent local stock contractors in 2017 to discuss the Canadian bucking bull industry. They had indicated that there is a need for more events and activities that involve bucking bull development in Canada. Through our conversations a program was developed that will support and enhance the Canadian bucking bull industry and its continued development. The event is held during our Colonial Days Fair program on

the Friday night.

The event filled the void that was created when we made a significant change in our fair programming, where we removed Chuckwagon racing from the schedule. We replaced 3 days of wagon racing with 2 days of Monster Truck and Tuff truck shows. Although this was successful, it did leave a void with our rural sector. The new event satisfied that rural sector and, being an extreme event, it proved to be a large draw for the urban sector and brought them to a Canadian bucking bull event.

We had a very successful year two. 26-2 year old bulls were bucked in the afternoon with a decent crowd. We were able to have CFCW come

The partnership is very exciting and will bring great things for WTC Saskatoon, Prairieland Park and the city in general.





If your Agricultural Society serves alcohol during any events you need to send someone to the SIRS workshop. Serve it Right Saskatchewan is the official provincial responsible service of alcohol program. It provides consistent training for the sale and service of alcohol, helping permit holders to ensure that alcohol-related activities are conducted with integrity and in a socially responsible manner.

Upon completion of the course, participants will be able to:

- Handle situations involving minors.
- Use an effective approach to discontinue or refuse to sell or serve alcohol
- Understand your legal responsibilities and liabilities.

Upon successfully completing the workshop each participant will receive a certificate for your records.

The course is normally \$50 per person, but as part of this year's convention there will be no charge to participants who have registered for the convention. Registration for the workshop is free, but it is limited to the first 20 people who return the registration form. The Serve it Right workshop registration form will be included in the convention packages and must be returned to the SAASE office in order to register for the course. Lunch will also be provided.

The second workshop that will take place on March 1st will be an Emergency Planning workshop. We all run events, and it is critical that we know what to do if something



- the introduction of a notable new idea or concept;

- a major facilities or grounds development;
- dealing with extreme adversity;
- involvement with industry partners;

- demonstrated community support for the organization

Family/Parade Day Celebrations July 15, 2018

Historically the Nipawin Exhibition Parade was held on the first day of our exhibition as kick off to our three-day event. The Nipawin and District Chamber of Commerce was the supporting partner that provided the manpower to coordinate and marshal the parade along with finding volunteers to judge the entries and they even provided the prizes.

In 2017, the Exhibition Association approached the Chamber of Commerce and the Nipawin Business Improvement District to see if they were interested in partnering in hosting a Canada 150 celebration in conjunction with the fair. The three parties agreed to host a Canada 150/Family Day celebration on the Sunday before the fair.

The day consisted of entertainment, food booths, and a vintage car show; face painting, games for the kids and fireworks. In addition, it was decided to move the Exhibition Parade to the Sunday and be part of the celebration. The day was provided to attendees at no cost other than the food they bought. The Chamber, the BID and the Town of Nipawin provided the funds and manpower to coordinate the day. The Nipawin Exhibition Association provided financial sponsorship for the day, but did not provide any other resources as our resources were consumed with the delivery of the fair. The day was a complete success and there were many requests to repeat the day in 2018.

After decades of the Nipawin & District Chamber of Commerce being the Parade Marshalls for the Exhibition, they decided that their involvement in the Parade did not support the

In the time between the 2017 and 2018 exhibitions. The Nipawin Business Improvement District ceased to operate and thus these resources were no longer there to support the 2018 Family Day either. The Town agreed

to support the day by providing funding for entertainment and offered the services of their Public Works department in whatever capacity they would help, but were not prepared to coordinate the event.

At this point, the Exhibition Association was not sure what to do. We knew that we did not have surplus resources to host such a day, but we knew that the longstanding tradition of the parade had to continue. We knew that Family Day celebration was well received by the community the year before. It brought people to town and it also provided an opportunity for families that could not afford to attend the fair to be able to spend the day as a family enjoying the parade and other family friendly activities.

The Exhibition Association made the decision to assume the responsibility of coordinating, funding and delivering the Family Day celebration and the parade. Although a very stressful undertaking in addition to our annual fair, we were able to provide another event for our community. Mother Nature was not as kind to us this year as she was in 2017, but the response from the community was positive and they hope we continue with Family Day as a kick off to our fair.

Taking on this event added extra expenses for the Exhibition Association so we are very grateful for the Financial Assistance from the Venture Project Grant from SAASE.



SAASE has made changes to the Venture Project Program - by making it possible to help out with a new program for 3 years. This allows a program or event to evolve - giving the new event an even better opportunity to succeed on an ongoing basis. The Vanscoy Agricultural Society is one of our Agricultural Societies applying for funding under the 3 They are partnering year program. up with a neighboring community - Delisle - on a Fall Fair. The first year was a tremendous success, and the Vanscoy Agricultural Society have applied for funding for the second year of their project. Below is the report from the first year of their new partnership with Delisle.

Year 1 of our Venture Project was a huge success. Our participation with the Delisle Harvest Festival was a fantastic opportunity for our Agricultural Society to help bring back our Fair. We were able to contribute to our local community by participating in a parade, hosting childrens entertainment (balloon twister and parachute games/songs), community bingo, and a cake celebration for our 35th anniversary. All of these engaged the community and brought community members through the doors to view the exhibits as well. Fall Fest was happy to have us add to their program and provide another opportunity to engage our community with the local festivities.

Our exhibit numbers were up this year and it was a wonderful showcase for the exhibitor's to demonstrate their knowledge, skill, and talent. Rural living was promoted through exhibits and through meaningful conversations

Western college brought in Agnes the life-size calving simulator - students were able to see how veterinarians diagnose and assist live animal birthing. There were demonstrations throughout the day.

The Indiginous Pavillion was also in the Agribition Building. The Pavillion featured a number of informative, artistic and interactive displays including: drummers and champion dancers, story telling, craft making, language stations and more. CWA also announced a partnership with the provincial and federal governments for the creation of a new mentorship program aimed at young people in Saskatchewan agriculture, with applications opening on December 14.












How to prevent an outbreak of **ENTERIC PATHOGENS** on your grounds & at your event



Pathogen cases and outbreaks have been linked to fairs, open farms and petting zoos worlwide. An infective dose of some pathogens only takes 10 cells and survive for months outside of the animal host. Prepare your event or activity the best you can to ensure the health of your visitors by understanding the risks and taking preventative measures.

What are pathogens? and what is the public risk?

Pathogens are microorganisms that cause disease in humans. They are traditionally carried by animals and shed in their feces, but the pathogens do not cause illness to these animals.

Pathogens will only make people ill if they have entered the digestive tract, which usually occurs after an individual eats or touches their face. In most cases, the individual has not washed their hands after touching a contaminated surface. Children, pregnant women and the elderly are most at risk.

Those who become infected may experience:

- Diarrhea
- Vomiting
- Stomach cramps
- Sometimes kidney failure or even death

Agricultural fairs and petting zoos are the ideal place for the general public to engage with animals and learn more about agriculture. In Canada, 89% of fairs either encourage or allow the public to access the livestock area. However, inherent in that opportunity is the risk for the public to become ill due to enteric pathogens. These risk are increased by:

- Almost 1/3 of animal zones (livestock barns, arenas and petting zoos) have children and/or food areas directly adjacent to animal areas
- Only up to 25% of animal zones being sanitized regularly
- A small study found zoonotic pathogens were present in
 5 out of 6 (83%) of animal operations tested in Canada.
- It is estimated that 14% of illnesses from zoonotic pathogens arise through direct contact with animals

Therefore, it is essential that these places take the necessary precautions to prevent illness, for the sake of everyone involved. Define **Enteric**: /ɛnˈtɛrɪk/ *adjective* Relating to or occurring in the intestines.

Define **Zoonosis**:

/ˌzəʊəˈnəʊsɪs/ *noun* A disease which can be transmitted to humans from animals.

Define Pathogens:

/ˈpaθədʒ(ə)ns/ *noun* A bacterium, virus or other microorganism that can cause disease.

Why you should care

- No one wants anyone to become ill as a result of their negligence. Taking the necessary precautions will ensure that you've done everything you can to protect your visitors.
- 2. If you don't take preventative measures, you could become entangled in years of litigation.
- Each year, E. Coli O157 cases represents \$26.7 million lost, without including long-term costs and emotional damages.
- 4. Bad news travels fast, especially in the world of social media. If someone gets infected on your grounds, it will damage your reputation, which will be reflected in lower attendance rates, less sponsorship and less support from your community.





Here are some steps you can take to help prevent contamination and risk.

CLEAN.

First and foremost, it is important to clean and disinfect buildings/equipment on a regular basis, including animal water and feed containers, transport crates, containers, trailers and vehicles. Animal zone surfaces should be cleaned daily (walkways, fences, faucets, etc). When cleaning, it is recommended to use diluted bleach (1:16 water) or follow the instruction for ammonium compounds. To kill as many pathogens as possible, the cleaning agent should be left on the surface for ten minutes. Record any sanitization procedures, including what was done, when it was done, and who did it as proof in case a concern of negligence is brought forward.

Keep animals and animal area clean. Manure, urine and unsanitary bedding should be removed as soon as possible. Consider fan direction, dust particles and other potential risks when cleaning animal zones.

SIGN & SERVE.

One of the best preventative measures is to have adequate signage and services available to the public. Analyze the grounds to place hand washing and hand sanitizing stations in key locations that will receive and be able to handle visitor traffic. Make sure to record your plan. If possible, provide a space where visitors can store personal belongings before entering animal zones. Include signage as to the need for preventative measures such as hand washing and instructions on proper hand washing techniques, as well as the importance of cleaning contaminated surfaces such as shoes, strollers and clothing. Signage to prevent highrisk contact behaviour is also important.

EVALUATE.

Evaluate your grounds to see if other measures can be taken to decrease the risk, such as:

- Creating transition zones to promote hygiene and decrease chances of contamination in food and children areas.
- Creating one-way flow traffic to help control the spread of pathogens.
- Designating areas that are inaccessible to the public for animal and waste movement.
- Test and treat water as needed.

EDUCATE.

As an ideal source to educate the public on agriculture, it is also an ideal platform to educate the public on farm hygiene. Increasing awareness on the subject prevents risk by up to 18%. CAFE has prepared a video available on YouTube in French and English that can be shared with visitors before or during their visit to your grounds.

How to wash your hands properly

- 1. Soap and thoroughly massaging hands, creating a lather
- 2. Scrub for at least 20 seconds
- 3. Rinse with water (warm or cold)
- Dry hands with paper towel or hand dryer, NOT on your clothes





What is the situation in Canada? **your event is more at risk than you think.**

Canadian grounds that host animal zones are engaging in risky behaviours, such as:

- Food allowed in up to 71% of animal zones across Canada
- Only 19-25% of animal zones following regular surface sanitizing
- Less than 1/3 of animal zones providing hand washing facilities
- Irregular/infrequent removal of animal feces
- Lack of hand washing and hand sanitizing stations
- Lack of signage in regards to the risks and corrective actions

Visitors are engaging in risky behaviours as well:

- 0-77% compliance in terms of hand washing and hand sanitizing behaviour, although visitors are 4.8x likelier to wash their hands when a staff person is present.
- Hand-to-face contact in animal zones
- Letting animals lick their hands
- Eating or drinking in animal zones
- Children putting objects in their mouths, biting their nails, sucking thumbs, etc.
- Do not adequately clean contaminated surfaces such as strollers, clothes, shoes



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Animals are more susceptible to shed pathogens when they are under a higher level of stress. Research shows animals shed more pathogens in the summer and fall months because animals are being transported, confined, and are being handled more by humans at fairs and expositions, which leads to higher stress levels. Comingling also increases the likelihood of transmission between animals.

However, many of these risk factors can be mitigated with the a few simple actions available on page 3.

Safety Days Wrap up for 2018



This year's Provincial Safety day Program has just wrapped up. SAASE or our members were part of 18 safety days in 16 communities in 2018. Safety days were held in Assiniboia, Belle Plaine, Biggar, Eston, Humboldt, Lloydminster, Meadow Lake, Mortlach, Nipawin, North Battleford, Outlook, Prince Albert, Swift Current, Unity, Weyburn and Yorkton. Over 5,000 school children were educated about safety by over 500 volunteers donating over 5,000 hours of their time.

SAASE has continued to develop partnerships as we move along on the safety day program. In addition to the Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture, SaskPower, the Progressive Agriculture Foundation, Canadian Agricultural Safety Association and Community Initiatives Fund, SAASE has also been able to add some new partners and communities to the group. We are working with the Prairie South School Division, Safe Communities Humboldt, the towns of Eston and Outlook, as well as the Belle Plaine Hutterite Colony.
