The Tourism Saskatchewan component will take place from 7pm - 10pm at all the locations except Arcola. The outline for the Tourism Saskatchewan segment of the program is as follows:

In March 2019, Tourism Saskatchewan entered into a master services agreement with Destination Think! (DT!), a tourism strategy firm with global content marketing experience. DT! contributes to the development of the always-on strategy across the province's target and developmental markets and across marketing channels.

As part of the development of a longterm marketing strategy for Tourism Saskatchewan, DT! has identified additional research to be undertaken. PlaceDNATM is a collaborative research process involving residents. The process is built on the assumption that residents are best positioned to define the way that Saskatchewan can truly deliver on its identity. Locals are a place's best (or worst) advocates and play a large role in creating the visitor experience. DT!'s Place DNATM is a proprietary research process that assesses local attitudes and perspectives about the province and identifies gaps and inaccuracies in how outsiders perceive us, while also educating residents on the benefits of the visitor economy. Place DNATM is not only a tool for marketing, but can also be used to inform economic development strategies.

The research objectives of this project are to:

- Understand our identity so that we can move towards more authentic marketing, supported by our stakeholders and residents.

- Dig deeper into the regional nuances of the province's identity and unique selling points to assist marketing and product development efforts to differentiate the province from our competitors.

- Gather insights that will allow Tourism Saskatchewan and other industry partners to improve the quality of tourism products and visitor experiences.

- Identify gaps related to how Tourism Saskatchewan and industry stakeholders communicate to target audiences.

SAASE and our Board of Directors look forward to meeting with our Agricultural Societies during the Regional Meetings and hope that you make the time to attend the meeting in your area. Meeting packages will be sent out and emailed out to all Agricultural Societies over the next couple of weeks.

SAASE History



Historical Review - Saskatchewan Agricultural Societies' Association - Part 2



This is part two of a series of excerpts taken from the "Historical Review – Saskatchewan Agricultural Societies Association and Agricultural Societies" – published in 1980, with the research and writing done by Herbert H. Clark.

The Agricultural Societies Convention which was held January 11 – 13, 1921 in the Agricultural College Building provided ample evidence that the Association in collaboration with the Director of Agricultural Extension, College of Agriculture, could stage a meaningful convention. The Association was able to compliment the program put on by the College by providing speakers on matters relating to the management of societies. A feature


of early conventions of the Association was a special program for secretaries (secretary-treasurers) of member societies. These programs would take the form of panel discussions with six or eight participants contributing to and assisting with discussions.

The early involvement of Agricultural Societies in making it possible for new settlers to learn more about quality stock was very evident in reviewing the history of the development of the Agricultural Society program in Saskatchewan. Department of Agriculture and College of Agriculture staff conducted many demonstrations and clinics on culling poultry flocks, beef and swine breeding stock, pointers on the value of purebred sires and also the great importance of clean, pure

certified and registered seed grain stock. Many of these demonstrations were held in conjunction with livestock shows and sales, summer fairs and fall seed fairs. Spring livestock sales were very popular in the 1920's and although prices were not strong, the sales did provide an opportunity for farmers to obtain new breeding stock, and at the same time pick up ideas on livestock management. Most sales were attended by specialists from the Department of Agriculture. Seed and poultry shows were very popular in the 1920's. It was quite common to have forty or more seed shows and thirty plus poultry shows in a winter season. The main reason for the popularity of these shows was the urgent need for settlers to know good seed stock and to understand the

difference between poultry for utility and poultry for fancy appearance. Poultry culling demonstrations at the University and in rural Saskatchewan were so popular in the 1920's that it was impossible to obtain a sufficient number of instructors when the Extension Department offered to provide men who would go out and cull flocks - the demand was overwhelming. In order to solve the problem, courses on culling poultry flocks were held at the University and Agricultural Societies were asked to send a representative to learn the techniques of culling poultry.

The history of Agricultural Societies would not be complete without reference to the Provincial Seed Fair which was held during the annual convention of Agricultural Societies. The Seed Fair, in its prime, overtaxed available space for display purposes. The tractor laboratory had to be pressed into use as it was the only location with sufficient room.

The Saskatchewan Agricultural Societies Association continually urged local societies to make communities more attractive by encouraging home beautification projects, community improvement projects and the construction of multipurpose buildings to meet the demand for recreation and social needs, especially for young people. This fact clearly denotes the great importance of an aggressive Agricultural Society Association in the community. An Agricultural Society was expected to be the motivating force behind all activities for the entire community. Judging of exhibits at summer fairs, seed, poultry and livestock shows has always been of concern to the

Societies and the Extension Department. Livestock judging courses and demonstrations were held at the University of Saskatchewan on a number of occasions. The first major conference to train judges for women's exhibits, however, were held at North Battleford and Weyburn in the early 1920's. It is interesting to note that in 1922 the first demonstrations on good farming practices were conducted by Agricultural Societies. These demonstrations took the form of automobile tours to selected farms in the community where speakers from the University and governments gave talks on good farming and home beautification practices which were being used. These demonstrations clearly pointed out the value of first hand viewing of good practices; since farmers were able to see examples of what was recommended practices for good husbandry.


In addition to being very involved at her school Reilly worked very hard in her community. Reilly has a passion for horses and gave riding lessons to some

Moosomin Hosts 4H Provincial Judging Competition



One of the best partnerships that our Agricultural Societies have is with 4 H. Advancing from six regional competitions held between April and July, 38 4-H members from all corners of the province met in Moosomin, SK on August 23 and 24, 2019 for the Saskatchewan 4-H Provincial Judging competition, presented by title sponsor: Viterra. Despite over 2" of rain pouring down, it didn't dampen their spirits, and the weekend was a success. Participants learned a lot as they competed in seven different judging classes over the two days. Competitive judging is a great opportunity to develop critical thinking skills and to help train and educate future judges for the livestock industry!






Regina to Host CAFE/SAASE Convention November 11 - 13, 2020

- Awarded to an agricultural society celebrating a significant anniversary year milestone. Agricultural societies wishing to be recog-

SAASE Receives Funding to Support Provincial Safety Day Program

The Community Initiatives Fund (CIF) approved funding for SAASE's Provincial Safety Day program. This is the sixth year that SAASE has been approved. The funding will help out by continuing to fund our volunteer safety day coordinators workshop held each Fall in Regina, as well as assisting with resource materials for our safety days and staffing costs. The funding supporting the Provincial Safety Day Program allows SAASE and our Agricultural Societies to continue this important program, and also build a network of great volunteers across the province. Over the past number of years SAASE and our Agricultural Societies have accessed more than \$600,000 for programming and small capital projects through the CIF. \$2.1 Million in CIF Funding will Support 137 Saskatchewan Programs

News 2020 Provincial Safety Day Program



Many in agriculture know someone whose life has been affected by a farmrelated injury or death. The statistics are sobering. Even more tragic is that these incidents could have been prevented with a few simple safety precautions. With this in mind the Saskatchewan Association of Agricultural Societies and Exhibitions (SAASE) and the Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture have partnered on a Provincial Safety Day Program over the past eight years. SAASE's expertise in providing provincial programming, as well as Saskatchewan's network of Agricultural Societies experience in working with youth and community groups and management of many of Saskatchewan's facilities, made SAASE and its members the natural choice to deliver the program.

The strength of any program of this scope is the quality of organizations delivering the program, as well as the partnerships that are developed both provincially and locally. In addition to the Ministry of Agriculture, SAASE has developed partnerships with national and international groups devoted to keeping our youth safe - the Progressive Agriculture Foundation and the Canadian Agricultural Safety Association. Saskatchewan's Agricultural Societies have some of the most devoted, committed, and community minded volunteers in Canada, and this partnership has allowed SAASE to train those volunteers across the province to deliver safety days. With the training, education and resources supplied by the Progressive Agriculture Foundation and CASA, SAASE has developed a provincial network of volunteers dedicated to teaching Saskatchewan's youth about safety. The additional funding partnership that SAASE has developed with the Community Initiatives Fund (CIF) has allowed our volunteers to attend the Safety Day coordinators workshop at no cost to them.

From 2016 - 2019 - over 50 safety days were hosted by Saskatchewan's Agricultural Societies, with over 15,000 students from 75 communities attending. Each year 500 volunteers donate over 5,000 hours of their time to teach our children about safety.

These safety days would not be possible without the support of our other provincial partners. The Community Initiatives Fund (CIF), SaskPower, Prairie South School Division, and the Saskatchewan Safety Council have all joined SAASE provincially to help out as partners. These provincial partners are in addition to the many local partners who help our Agricultural Societies out with hosting the safety days. SAASE and all of our partners look forward to 2020. The tentative schedule for 2020 is as follows.


Mortlach Celebrates 12th Annual Saskatoon Berry Festival

Donors who gave \$112 or more saw their name in the Fair Book on the Century Plus page.

A large slice of home made pie costs only \$3 at AberFair. However, one of our favourite fair traditions, THE PIE BOOTH, captured the imagination of donors and so they signed up! How do we find enough free pie for all the donors plus the 1000 patrons that come to our fair? Our pie committee solicited pies from local folks that make them. We invited other locals to make a donation towards buying pies. We then contracted with a local commercial pie maker to deliver 50 freshly baked home made fruit pies the morning of fair day. A local citizen baked gluten-free pies in her gluten-free kitchen to add to our choices.

Other ideas? Those exhibitors entering a slice in one or more of our 11 pie classes brought the remainder of their pie to the booth for sale. HOT PINK was our fair theme colour this year (we created a variety of classes inviting hot pink themes). The pink theme carried through to our pie table. We encouraged Century Plus donors to challenge their neighbours to pull out their cheque books, too.

All of us in small communities know how Pie Booths work! We bake a pie to donate to the fair. We work at the pie booth on fair day. We buy a slice (or 2 or 3) of pie (sometimes our own!). We help clean up the Pie Booth at the end of the day. Then we do it all again next year!

This year's Frontier Days was also held under some weather conditions not ideal to the festivities.

"The rain was good," Tracey Stevenson, manager of the Swift Current Ag & Ex



organization which hosts the event said, looking at the situation from an agricultural point of view. "It did kind of dampen some of our planning process on where things were going to be placed, and occur, so we had lots of shuffling to do all week."

Events affected by the weather include a portion of the rodeo which had to be cancelled, as well as the Colter Wall and Nitty Gritty Dirt Band concert, which was relocated to the Innovation Credit Union iPlex. Despite the weather, attendance was quite good. Final participant numbers are not yet known, but over 21,000 people took part in Frontier Days this year.

The Ag & Ex organization spends a lot of time preparing for, and planning out the programming for the four-day rodeo and fair. "We are actually already preparing for 2020 [Frontier Days]," Stevenson said. "It's a whole year process, you start booking your entertainment, and planning your events."

This year's theme for Frontier Days was 'Prairie Roots and Cowboy Boots.' Going back to the 'prairie roots' of the event itself, Stevenson said that it was great to be able to carry on the tradition during its 81st year.

"Oh, it's an amazing experience, it's always very nice to get it organized and have everybody come out, it's a community event, it's a family event, and you make memories...even like going to the [Frontier Days] Parade, it's like a childhood memory, and you carry it on to the next generation."

She said that being able to bring so many people, including former residents to the city, was another plus. "A lot of people come back home [for Frontier Days], it's like a homecoming."

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This year marked the first year of the Nipawin 4H Horse Show! The last time the 4H show took place was back in 1995. and Lauren Demmans. During the afternoon clubs were able to participate in the Nipawin Parade, and after that Henry Schellenberg led a horsemanship clinic for all the 4H members.

The classes had a points-based system,

which allowed for some friendly competition among clubs. Whoever had the most points by the end of the day won a trophy, which is actually the resurrected trophy from previous 4H Shows. All competitors also received prizes, thanks to our generous sponsors.

As the Light Horse Director, my goal was to have at least 2 clubs participate, so we would be able to have a competition. We ended up with 5 clubs being represented from North-East Saskatchewan, and 15 members participating. This was excellent to see, and we received a lot of positive feedback from members who want to come again next year!

Our goals for next year are to extend the invitation to clubs outside of the North-East area, as well as bring in more members from clubs who have competed already. We would love to be able to offer more prizes and opportunities for 4H members to showcase their skills.

Bikes and Bulls Finishes Up 3rd Year



The Lloydminster Exhibition's Bikes and Bulls was the first 3 year Venture project that the SAASE board of Directors approved. The SAASE Board felt that moving the Venture Project program to allow a project to be approved for 3 years would give the Agricultural Society a better opportunity to make the project succeed Since then both Nipawin and Vanscoy have been approved for 3 year projects. SAASE budgets money every year for the Venture Project program and all of our Agricultural Societies are encouraged to apply if you have a new program or are wanting to enhance an existing program. Below is the report submitted by the Lloydminster Exhibition for their Bulls and Bikes event.

The Lloydminster Agricultural Exhibition Association (LAEA) was approached by 2 prominent local stock contractors in 2017 to discuss the Canadian bucking bull industry. They had indicated that there is a need for more events and activities that involve bucking bull development in Canada. Through our conversations a program was developed that will support and enhance the Canadian bucking bull industry and its continued development. The event is held during our Colonial Days Fair program on the Friday night.

The event filled the void that was created when we made a significant change in our fair programming, where we removed Chuckwagon racing from the schedule. We replaced 3 days of wagon racing with 2 days of Monster Truck and Tuff truck shows. Although this was successful, it did leave a void with our rural sector. The new event satisfied that rural sector and, being an extreme event, it proved to be a large draw for the urban sector and brought them to a Canadian bucking bull event.



We had a very successful year three. 52-2 year old bulls were bucked in the morning/afternoon with a decent crowd. We were able to have CFCW come on board again and be a major media sponsor which gave our event even better exposure. We were also able to offer a 'behind the chutes' experience for major sponsors and that was extremely successful – we will be continue this feature every year.



We continued with a ladies division which saw 6 ladies compete. The women had to flank their own bulls and this component is becoming more popular at other bull bucking events.

We had our PBR event later in the evening starting at 6pm. We had a great evening of outstanding performance that left the crowd on the edge of their seats. We had a long go of 25 riders and then a short go of the top 10. It made for a great evening. We had a packed house and grandstand for the evening performance and great weather to crown our champion.

We thank SAASE for the support of this new event over the past 3 years that has made our fair that much better.

Venture Project

Queen City Ex - The Farm

The Queen City Ex in Regina has been working at bringing agriculture back to their fair. SAASE have been working with them - helping them out wherever we can as far as resources are concerned. Below is a summary of how the second year went.

2019 marked the second year that the Queen City Exhibition has brought Agriculture back to our summer fair. Last year The Farm utilized a space of roughly 10,000 square feet. This year The Farm expanded to use a space



of 43,615 square feet. Granted the entire area wasn't used for The Farm it was still a marked increase in terms of the overall footprint. This year the area focused on three main components: Friendly Farm Petting Zoo, Safety at the Farm and an Entertainment Zone.





The Friendly Farm Petting Zoo was a massive success! It was by far one of our most bustling areas and our initial feedback has been extremely positive. People of all ages were able to pet, feed and ask all types of questions regarding how the animals are being raised and cared for (as well as many more). It was largely an urban population that took in The Farm so people that aren't very aware, or familiar with, agriculture were able to learn more about farm



animals. The staff of Ol' McDale's was extremely insightful and always able to answer questions.

Safety at the Farm was in integral part of the 2019 Queen City Ex. The Canadian Agricultural Safety Association (CASA) brought an interactive table top display, SaskPower displayed an electrical safety demonstration (including over-head dangers) and Mosaic brought a wealth of information regarding potash, its utility and safety surrounding the mineral.

The Entertainment Zone included the Magic Bean Show, Kids Petal Tractor, Sunflower Saddle Ranch and



Inflatable Corn Maze. This area was fantastic for kids to release some energy and be in a "farm-like" setting. The Magic Bean show in particular was educational in nature and generally well attended.

Next year, we'd like to increase the exposure of Crops at the Farm. With more support from local and provincial agencies there is room to plan more programming in relation to crops that are grown locally, their value provincially, domestically and internationally in addition to increased awareness and understanding of the role that our local crops play in the economy.



Regina Brings the Rodeo to the Fair

2019 marked the inaugural year of the Queen City Exhibition Pile O' Bones Rodeo. The three day event was a major undertaking and overall it was also a major success. Each night the average attendance of the Rodeo was above 2,100. Considering that there were countless other places for guests to spend their time we consider this attendance to be above average for year one.

With the help of the C5 Rodeo Company Inc. and Canadian Western



Agribition our REAL team was able to put together a pro rodeo that we could all feel proud of. We are of the opinion that year one was our launching pad and that moving forward there is so much that we can adjust and refine in order to put on the best event possible!

By bringing in world class stock, athletes, announcers and organizers, the Pile O' Bones Rodeo ran seamlessly and captivated the audience with a powerful pyro display and opening ceremony that paid homage to the history of Regina and why it was once referred to as Pile of Bones. This event was unique to Regina and this helped make it our own. The



acknowledgement that Regina is situated on Treaty 4 land and an indigenous pow wow dancer helped to solidify the Pile O' Bones Rodeo as uniquely our own.

With three full evenings of heart-pounding excitement this event did not disappoint. From the collective gasps of the crowd when a bareback horse would toss it's rider to the comedic relief brought on by the Announcer there was something for everyone to enjoy.



Agricultural Education at Agribition

Agricultural education has never been more important than it is today. As our population gets further and further removed from the farm the importance of telling the story of agriculture and where our food comes from has never been greater. In addition to all the great agricultural education programs that Saskatchewan's Agricultural Societies run - none are bigger than the program that Canadian Western Agribition runs. Over the last number of years SAASE has helped out with the Mosaic Potash display and the SaskPower electrical safety display in the Family Ag Pavilion. This year over 10,000 students in addition to all the other Agribition attendees went through the educational displays. The area was a huge success, as was this year's edition of Agribition. Jump in International buyers, Inaugural Maple Leaf Finals rodeo and record setting registrations among highlights at Agribition 2019

The 49th edition of Canadian Western Agribition (CWA) concluded Saturday, November 30, and saw 121,326 visitors over six days.

CWA 2019 kicked off Monday, November 25 with free gate admission, courtesy of the Saskatchewan Roughriders, leading to one of the busiest opening days on record. CWA's International program registered over 1,300 guests from 80 countries, including 231 international buyers.



"We're seeing the work Agribition is doing overseas pay off for our exhibitors here at home," says CWA President Chris Lees. "With more than 200 buyers at the show, the business opportunities at Agribition continue to grow."

Once again, CWA's registered education programs were full to capacity with school groups taking advantage of even more options, including food demonstrations. In total, approximately 10,000 students took part in Agribition programs during the week. Registrations for the Indigenous Ag Summit, and the Agri-Preneurship workshop were also at record levels.

Among the new events at CWA this year, the Maple Leaf Finals rodeo brought a new calibre of competition in the Brandt Centre and included two sell-out performances. "Rodeo is a core part of Agribition and a real showcase of our western culture," says CWA CEO Chris Lane. "Every contestant, volunteer, performer and partner in the Maple Leaf Finals should be proud of bringing the newest pro circuit finals to Agribition."

CWA President Chris Lees says planning for CWA's 50th show in 2020 has already begun. CWA's 50th show will be held November 30 to December 5, 2020 and will feature 11 national breed shows; an

unprecedented gathering of quality seedstock in Canada.

"For fifty shows, Agribition has always worked at getting better and being a positive place for the livestock industry to gather," says Lees. "We couldn't be more excited to show our appreciation to the exhibitors and partners that have become part of the CWA family over the last halfcentury. In the coming months, CWA will announce more details about programming for 2020.

Heritage Award

Battlefords Agricultural Society Recognized

The Battlefords Agricultural Society continues to make valuable contributions to the community 134 years after its foundation.

The Battlefords Chamber of Commerce and BBEX Committee awarded its Heritage Award to the community nonprofit last week. The agricultural society was nominated for the award about seven years ago, according to general manager Jocelyn Ritchie, but didn't take the grand prize.

Educating the public is one of the society's goals, in the past and in the present. Reflections of an Era: A Look Back on 100 Years of the Battlefords Agricultural Society is a booklet published by the Battlefords Agricultural Society in 1985 that details the society's history.

In 1885, a group of people south of the North Saskatchewan River began an organization "that would look after the interests of farmers." An initial agricultural fair, however, was delayed due to the North West Rebellion, Ritchie said. Battleford's first fair was



in 1887 after the Battle River Agricultural Society was formed. As found in the booklet, one farmer wrote in 1891 the man making a living only by grain farming is wasting his time. "Such farming cannot pay in any country, and the feeling is steadily gaining ground that more attention should be paid to the livestock department of agriculture." According to an argument made in 1901, even if a farmer didn't get the prize money at the exhibition, he would benefit from the agricultural society in an educational way, "worth many times the annual fee."

An agricultural society was formed north of the river in 1905. North Battleford incorporated in 1913. The two towns had a rivalry, but joined together as one agricultural society in 1956. The ag society has had its ups and downs, such as in 1960. The board of directors at the time invested their own money to save the exhibition.

Today, the society offers education for member farmers, and students who don't live on the farm.

"A lot of our urban kids don't realize anything about what goes on in farming and how food gets to their plate," Ritchie said, and the society tries to fix that.
