
SAASE to Partner with Ministry of Agriculture -Progressive Agriculture on 15 Safety Days for 2014

Farm Safety and keeping our children hation - ATV + safe has always been a huge priority in our communities. In 2012 the Ministry of Agriculture entered into a 3 year partnership with SAASE on the delivery of Farm Safety Days by our Agricultural Societies across Saskatchewan. In 2012 there were 2 Safety Days held, this year there were a total of 7 held and continuing with the momentum the program is gaining, 15 are scheduled to be held in 2014.

In addition to the Ministry of Agriculture. SAASE has developed partnerships with the Canadian Agricultural Safety Association and the Progressive Agriculture Foundation. The partnership has ensured that SAASE and our Agricultural Societies delivering the program have access to the most up to date training and to the best resources to make sure that the kids get the most out of our Farm Safety Days.

If you are interested in hosting a Farm Safety Day you must apply for that day by July 15th of the year before to host a day. Once approved a Safety Day coordinators workshop will be organized. SAASE applied for and was approved for a total of 15 Farm Safety Days in 2014. The locations approved are in Lloydminster, Swift

Current, Canora, Weyburn, Yorkton, Prince Albert, Saskatoon, Kelvington, Nipawin, Maryfield, Moose Jaw, Glenavon and Vanscoy.

Progressive Agriculture put on a Farm Safety Day Coordinators workshop hosted by SAASE, which was held in Regina on September 30/October 1 A total of 25 people took part in the workshop. Progressive Agriculture's Bernard Geshke led the participants through a 2 day certification course. SAASE has hosted a Coordinators Workshop in each of the last 2 years. Because of the commitment of the Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture and SAASE's Agricultural Societies, the training workshop has become the largest in Canada. There were some great ideas brought forward, as Bernard went through the program, as

well as making everyone aware of the tremendous resources that are available through both Progressive Agriculture and the Canadian Agricultural Safety Association. During the 2 days a number of presenters were brought in to the meeting using Skype. Glen Blahey from CASA did a presentation on the various programs and resources available through CASA. Sarah Pilgrim and Susan Reynolds Porter talked about Progressive Agriculture's administration, reporting and support available.

Bill Thibodeau from Saskatchewan's Farmers with Disabilities came in and did a presentation on the various programs and resources available through their program. The Farm Safety Day Coordinators workshop is helping SAASE and our Agricultural Societies develop a tremendous network of Farm Safety professionals across Saskatchewan. This is not only valuable for the Safety Days taking place in the next year, but is providing a valuable human resources for the future.

At this point SAASE has reached the maximum number of Safety Days that would be able to be coordinated for 2014. If you are interested in hosting a Farm Safety Day for 2015 please let the SAASE office know. the application for 2015 must be in by July 15th 2014. SAASE would like to thank the Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture for their support of this program. SAASE also looks forward to working with Progressive Agriculture, the Canadian Agricultural Safety Association and our 15 Farm Safety Day sites for 2014.





The Vanscoy Agricultural Society played host to a Farm Safety Day on September 17. 150 students from 6 schools around Vanscoy took part. The safety stations that the students went through included chemical safety, ATV, PTO, lawnmower/tractor, bicycle, small animal, first responder, and fire. At the end of the day all the students gathered where a local police officer talked to them about internet safety, the police, as well as recapping what the students had seen during the day.

One of the highlights of the day was Bob Simpson from CTV coming out from Saskatoon to do a story on the day. Bob and his cameraman joined the children for lunch and



then spent much of the afternoon walking from station to station and talking to volunteers. The news story they did was quite extensive and was shown across the province on the CTV affiliates on both the evening and afternoon newscasts, as well as during an edition of Farmgate. The

story was even picked up by CTV affiliates across Canada. A big thanks to Bob and CTV for the great coverage of this event.

Linda Wright from the Vanscoy Agricultural Society and her volunteer committee did a tremendous job of organizing the day. The students were given Progressive Agriculture T shirts, take home bags with a wide variety of safety items and goodies for the kids, snacks and a lunch. The Vanscoy Agricultural Society were able to get numerous businesses to help out and donate items. The weather cooperated



and the kids had a great time and learned an awful lot about safety. As part of the Progressive Agriculture program follow-up surveys were done with the students, volunteers, presenters and teachers. Feedback was overwhelmingly positive from everyone involved with the day, and those involved can't wait to put on next years.

SaskCulture Approves SAASE Cultural Program

SAASE was approved by SaskCulture earlier this year on a Capacity Building grant. This was a pilot project with 3 of our Agricultural Societies - Moose Jaw, Biggar and Swift Current. Dave White from Synergy Solutions was brought in to facilitate the process, and below is a summary of the project.

In keeping with SAASE's vision of "...communities coming together in positive interaction, experiencing a deep appreciation for our rural heritage, while embracing new cultures and expanding borders" this project was proposed to create and enhance the connection and sense of community with the various ethnic groups involved in a given community – as a template would be developed that could be used for future initiatives in other communities.

Three community Agricultural Societies we selected to collaborate with in the development of this culture capacity building initiative: Swift Current, Biggar, and Moose Jaw. Discussions were facilitated within each of these communities, comprised of various leadership, volunteers and ethnic representation.

The purpose of the facilitation was two-fold: that the group would come to a greater awareness of the common bonds of community among various ethnicities, and secondly that these multi-ethnic groups would generate and host initiatives that would enhance this awareness through their region. For further clarification, it was not simply the goal to create an event, but that through the coming together of multiple ethnicities as leader volunteers to create an event, the volunteers themselves would experience a greater sense of community awareness and understanding.

Synergy Solutions partnered with SAASE in hosting and facilitating these sessions in the communities. The initial format of the facilitation of these sessions was based in the 4-D cycle of Appreciative Inquiry, and specifically as the following:

Orientation

- 1. What is our purpose?
- 2. Where have we seen evidence of this happening?
- 3. What has been the most potent?
- 4. What challenges have we had enroute to fulfilling our purpose?
- 5. What decisions served us well?

Discovery

- 1. How has our community changed what demographic?
- 2. Where do we see growth in understanding and acceptance?
- 3. What is unique about the new demographic?

Brainstorming

- 1. What do we envision our purpose looking like if we had success?
- 2. What could we do to take steps toward that vision?
- 3. Who would we have to involve / engage?

Following these questions, the core group was encouraged to identify additional relationships from alternate ethnicities that may be open to being involved in creating, planning, organizing and hosting the event. Caution was given to ensure that all volunteers were to be included in the development of any new initiative, allowing the opportunity for co-creation, ensuring that all "owned" the result of the planning, and that no one group felt used or manipulated by another. This also served to ensure that no one group of volunteers became overwhelmed in the implementation.

Government of ______ Saskatchewan An action plan for that initiative including timelines and budgets was then created between the groups and SAASE with resulting events/activities scheduled to take place during the summer of 2014.

Recommendations Arising from Pilots

Additional communities could benefit from the cultural awareness and understanding that has been experienced within these pilot projects. The key to achieving this end will be engagement of volunteer leaders from representative cultural backgrounds, allowing them the freedom to shape specific activities within the general context of an event. The three question categories of "orientation", "discovery" and "brainstorming" can be used verbatim to begin the process of establishing the necessary dialogue for this to happen. If the volunteer group within the community identifies potential projects through these steps, then design and delivery stages can follow. The delivery stage must also include a component of celebration and the recognition of where cultures have been made more aware and understood, such as individual testimonies and stories.

One key that emerged through each facilitation: The groups should be encouraged that it is not just important to create an event, but rather to experience their own growing awareness and understanding of culture through their volunteer positions in creating whatever event is to be.

Once each group caught on to this key principle, their clarity and impacts advanced noticeably!

This workshop will be very valuable to those Agricultural Societies looking to make facility improvements over the next 2 years.

Over the last few years the Lethbridge Exhibition has undergone some tremendous change. Rudy Friesen and Doug Krzynanowksi will be discussing the changes Lethberidge has gone through. These include changes to the Board of Directors, staffing, programming, sponsorshi, events - basically the whole operations. Rudy and doug will not only discuss the changes, but more importantly how they were managed.

SaskEnergy is once again working with SAASE on our awards program. The SaskEnergy Volunteer Champion Awards will take place on Saturday March 1 at the Awards Luncheon. Volunteers are the lifeblood of our Agricultural Societies and communities - these awards give us an opportunity to recognize them. SAASE Members Approved for Funding CIF Announces New Program

SAASE members continue to access moeny through the CIF Community Vitality Program. Over the course of the program SAASE members have accesses nearly \$400,000 for small capital projects and Community Pride events. For the final deadline 3 SAASE member projects were approved. The Fairmede Agricultural Society was approved for \$10,000 for fairgrounds upgrades. The Ogema Agricultural Society was approved for \$6,305 for their 100th Anniversary celebration, and the Mortlach Agricultural Society was approved for \$5,700 for Historical Plaques to be placed around the community.

In addition to the funding announcements, the CIF also announced changes to the Community Vitality Program.

CIF Awards Almost \$4 Million in Grants and Announces New Programming for Saskatchewan Communities

The Community Initiatives Fund (CIF) today announced approval of 226 grants totaling \$3,981,021 in support of enhanced quality of life for Saskatchewan residents.

The CIF's programs contribute to individual, family and community wellbeing through grants for childhood development, positive life choices, active living, community celebrations and facility upgrades, and volunteerism.

Today, through its Community Grant

Program, the CIF approved 102 grants totaling \$1,596,765 in support of the wellbeing and health of Saskatchewan's children and youth, families and communities. Grant approvals through the Community Vitality Program total \$1,309,731 with 104 grants to help improve community facilities or support significant milestones and cultural community celebrations. The CIF also approved 20 grants totaling \$1,074,525 through its Physical Activity Grant Program to encourage increased physical activity among Saskatchewan residents.

In addition to the grants, the CIF today announced programming changes that are designed to simplify access to its funding and better align its programming with the needs and priorities of Saskatchewan communities. The CIF's Community Grant Program will be broadened to accommodate physical activity and problem gambling prevention initiatives, support of nonprofits, youth engagement and leadership development, and community cultural and milestone celebrations. The program will continue to help support healthy development of children and youth, community inclusiveness and accessibility, and positive life choices. It will include aspects of the CIF's former Physical Activity, Community Vitality (Pride Projects and Events), Urban Aboriginal, and Problem Gambling Prevention Programs. Small capital projects such as energy efficiencies or community facility upgrades will be supported through the new, two year Community Places and Spaces Program, replacing the Community Vitality Program. A community facility may be a rink, hall, arena, outdoor playground or ball diamond, or other community meeting place. Both programs become effective April 1, 2014.

"With these improvements, the Community Initiatives Fund will continue to support Saskatchewan communities and contribute to the health and wellbeing of children, youth and families," Parks, Culture and Sport Minister Kevin Doherty said. "Since its inception, the CIF has provided grants to communities, organizations and programs that have been enhancing the quality of life we enjoy here in Saskatchewan." "We're pleased to be able to continue our contributions to an enhanced quality of life for Saskatchewan people." says Tracey Mann, executive director of the Community Initiatives Fund. "And we're excited that through our new programming, the CIF will more directly align its grants to respond to the current needs of Saskatchewan communities."

The CIF is a Special Purpose Fund created through The Saskatchewan Gaming Corporation Act and governed by a volunteer board appointed through the Ministry of Parks, Culture and Sport. Grant recipients, their projects, and more information about CIF's new programming is at www.cifsask. org.

The Community Initiatives Fund is inviting interested individuals to volunteer as an adjudication committee member for its Community Grant Program. Four adjudication committees are being established in early 2014 and will be responsible for reviewing applications and providing funding recommendations to the CIF Board. Previous grant adjudication experience is not required, but applicants should be available to participate 3 times per year for 2 years. The CIF recently announced changes to its grant programs that will come into effect April 1, 2014 and is encouraging individuals from a variety of backgrounds and experience to participate as adjudicators. Events are one of the common threads in Canada to host an event." that weave throughout all communities in our province. They enhance the quality of life for our province's citizens, represent our culture and sense of pride in our communities and are a critical part of our province's history and future.

In addition to the contribution that events make to economic impact and employment within Saskatchewan's tourism sector, they also attract visitors to the province and enhance our positive reputation as an event hosting destination of choice. On December 9th Tourism Saskatchewan unveiled the province's new event hosting strategy. Below is the press release :

SASKATCHEWAN EVENT HOSTING STRATEGY **UNVEILED**

Today, Minister responsible for Tourism Saskatchewan Tim McMillan was joined by Tourism Saskatchewan CEO Pat Fiacco to unveil the Saskatchewan Event Hosting Strategy. The announcement marked the opening of Tourism Saskatchewan's HOST Saskatchewan Conference in Regina, attended by approximately 150 representatives of the tourism sector.

"The Grey Cup has capped off a remarkable year for events in Saskatchewan which included the JUNOs and the Memorial Cup," McMillan said. "This plan will help grow the tourism industry and ensure Saskatchewan will remain the best spot

Developing a provincial strategy for major event hosting was a priorityidentified in the Saskatchewan Plan for Growth. The framework that is now in place will make the province more competitive in terms of attracting events and expand capacity for hosting national and international sporting competitions and cultural celebrations.

"Saskatchewan hospitality is renowned," Fiacco said. "We have a reputation for success in hosting events that provide attendees and guests of our province with memorable experiences. At the same time, these events have a strong economic impact, bring profile to Saskatchewan and enhance business and tourism."

The new program seeks to enhance the province's capacity for hosting events by providing stakeholders with assistance in terms of mentorship and advice, and promotional and financial support. The strategy is designed to prompt growth in visitor attendance and tourism spending, as well as enhance the visitor experience. Consultations took place with stakeholders, event organizations and hosting groups throughout the development of the new strategy.

Communities, organizations and event committees are eligible to apply to four program categories:

Community Annual Events - provides project-based funding to help event organizers develop tourism festivals and events in communities across Saskatchewan (public celebrations with a total operating budget of less than \$100,000).

National and International Events - provides support to encourage the attraction and hosting of one-time, national and international sporting and cultural events to Saskatchewan.

Marquee Annual Events - provides project-based funding to help organizers develop tourism festivals and events in communities across Saskatchewan (generally with an operating budget of over \$100,000).

Special Tourism Products - provides support to activities which positively contribute to the image and perception of Saskatchewan as an enticing destination and demonstrate strong potential to generate significant visitation to our province

The Saskatchewan Event Hosting Strategy outlines criteria for each category. The document can be downloaded from Tourism Saskatchewan's industry website at www.industrymatters.com.

SAASE's Agricultural Societies host many of Saskatchewan's tourism events every year and this new program will present some great opportunities for funding or enhancing events. Ken Dueck who is the Executive Director of Industry and Community Development for Tourism Saskatchewan will be doing a presentation at the SAASE convention in Melfort.



SASKATCHEWAN **EVENT HOSTING** PROGRAM



Kinetic Exhibition Park came alive September 27-29, 2013 with the Swift Current Agricultural and Exhibition Association hosting the 'Young Ranchman's All Breeds Youth Livestock Show'. Being held in conjunction with the 'Ranchman's Ridin' and Recitin', Young Ranchman's added a youthful flare to a weekend steeped with old West traditions. The Beef Pen Show, Heavy Horse Pull, Stock Dog Trials and the Ranch Horse Competitions were a good mix of activities for all ages and interests to enjoy. Hooves and Feathers Show and Sale along with the Cowboy Poetry made for a fun filled weekend.

The Young Ranchman's Show is an event open to all youth 21 years of age and under. After many months of planning, 108 young Agricultural enthusiast gathered together for three days of not only livestock events, but also Public Speaking, Art, Photography, Team Show Judging and most importantly networking and team building. The overwhelming response to this show



confirmed the need to provide an event that encourages our provincial youth to remain involved in agriculture.

Thirty public speakers filled a board room waiting for their turn to present a speech. Topics ranged from 'Scuba Diving', 'Driving across the USA to the Denver Stock Show' to 'Swimming with the Dolphins' and 'Raising a Million Cats'. Some participants were seasoned speakers and others first time participants. The poise and confidence of the youth involved certainly impressed the panel of judges. Judges were teachers, Aldermen, ranchers and toastmasters - all individuals who have practiced public speaking within their professions. They noted the importance of this skill to the juniors, applauding them for a job well done and encouraging the group to keep excelling with this life skill.

Along with promoting youth to be responsible for livestock and to work alongside one another, this week-end offered help to those who were in need of a little extra expertise. This show was not just a cattle show for exhibiting livestock; a minimum of 2 'Skills competitions' had to be entered. Judging, showmanship, grooming, public speaking and art and photography were part of this year's skills category. Being that this was our first year, we wanted the youth that have never attended a show like this to have a good experience entering classes that were somewhat familiar.

Photos with a 'Beef Cattle Influence' theme were judged and displayed, as well as: pencil sketches, paintings, Modge Podge Skulls and jewellery boxes, Lego art, stall signs and hand drawn posters. All were an excellent exhibition of the young people's talents. Plans for next year are to include marketing and literature, as the intention is to include a few new additions every year.

Friday night was an evening to get acquainted



and have some fun after a feed of Pizza and Pop! Although it was in a mixer format, a lot of questions were asked about the agricultural industry to create a quiz bowl competition. Along with this, the marshmallow toss and other games, teams used strategies to get the Oreo cookie that was stuck to one team members face moved down to their mouth. You can imagine the excitement that caused! We ended the evening with a fun old fashion game of musical chairs.

Saturday morning would come very early for those who were involved in the show team judging competition. After instruction on the formalities; exhibitors worked in pairs to judge a class of bred yearling heifers and fill out a judging card in the preliminaries.

Twenty-three teams of 46 participants competed, most had no prior experience or knowledge of this type of competition. At the end of the day three senior teams and three junior teams made their way to the show ring 'one duo' at a time. One person took on the role of judge while the other was the ring man. Reasons given to the crowd on a microphone were well presented.

At the end of the competition the top two senior teams and two junior teams were announced. It was interesting to receive the feedback we had on this competition as many pairs were already planning their strategy for next year.

Because we followed their criteria and met all the requirements, we are the first Saskatchewan- based youth livestock show that qualifies youth to move on to compete at the Canadian National Young Cattleman

Everyone was excited to look for red ribbons!! There was also a table of garden produce for sale that people had donated - many folks purchased vegetables for their family's meals.

Identification Program

SRASE News Ministry of Agriculture Begins Premises Identification Program

Recently, the Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture began operation of a Premises Identification (PID) registry. Over the next few months, the Ministry plans to contact agricultural exhibitions and assist them to register on the new voluntary database. This new registry will take over the current PID database operated by the Canadian Cattle Identification Agency (CCIA).

Premises identification is one of three pillars of a full traceability system. The other two pillars are animal identification and animal movement reporting. Together the three pillars enable veterinarians and others to track the locations where animals have been located and to identify other animals with which they have been in contact.

Premises Identification:

• allows for rapid notification of livestock and poultry stakeholders

• helps prepare for animal health and environmental emergencies (e.g. livestock disease and any compromise to food integrity)

• facilitates rapid evacuation of animals in the event of a natural disaster or man-made emergency (e.g. flood, fire, hazardous chemical spill)

• helps track animals in an emergency

• reduces the impact of an emergency

• helps maintain or provide for greater market access

A premises identification number is a unique number assigned to a parcel of land, on which animals are grown, kept, assembled or disposed. The system will be voluntary; however the Ministry and industry will encourage producers and operators to enroll.

Over the next several months, Ministry staff will be in contact with specific sectors of the livestock industry to participate in the launch and testing of the database. In addition to Agricultural Exhibitions, we will be contacting vet clinics, community pastures and abattoirs.

In the case of Agricultural Societies, I will contact each location by phone and encourage enrollment (it is voluntary to enroll). The phone interview should take approximately 15 minutes, obtaining information such as contact information, legal land description of the exhibition, species of animals held at the exhibition and numbers of animals of each species. A consent form will also need to be signed.
