### 1600 Lloydminster Students Learn Where Their Food Comes From



Over 1600 grade 1 and 2 students attended Ag Education Day 2017 in Lloydminster on Thursday April 6 - hosted by the Lloydminster Exhibition. The Lloydminster Exhibition partnered with the Lloydminster Public School Division, Lloydminster Catholic School Division, Northwest School Division and Buffalo Trail School Division to have their students attend. The focus of the day is to promote agricultural awareness of the many facets in the agricultural industry. Young children are often unaware of how their food is produced - they only know what they see in the grocery store. The day was divided into three sessions, with the tour starting as the students entered the Co-op Marketplace. Tour guides took their groups into the barn. The students would then rotate through three sets of 7 educational stations. Stations included

### **SAASE Partners on Pizza Farms**



As people become less and less involved with agriculture - educating our youth on where their food comes from has never been more important. Saskatchewan's Agricultural Societies and SAASE have always been involved with agricultural education - it is at the core of what we do. Over the last number of years SAASE has developed partnerships with government, corporate and other nonprofit groups on agricultural education - in addition to the work that our Agricultural Societies do, SAASE also works on other agricultural education projects.

Each year a number of Pizza Farms are hosted around Saskatchewan. The Pizza Farms give school children an opportunity for hands on learning about agriculture. In addition to rotating through a number of agricultural education stations - the students also have the opportunity to plant vegetables that would be put on a pizza. The children not only get to plant the seeds in the spring, but then they harvest what they have planted in the fall. There are 9 pizza farms set up across Saskatchewan - they are located in Lanigan, Watrous, Saskatoon, Swift Current, Yorkton, Tisdale, Moose Jaw, Kindersley and Prince Albert.

This year SAASE worked with a number of groups to help out at some of the Pizza Farm locations. In addition to Mosaic, SAASE also worked with the Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture, Ag in the Classroom and Monsanto on the program. The Mosaic display was used in Yortkon, Saskatoon and Moose Jaw.













The Pizza farms were basically set up the same regardless of location, with school children being bused out to the Pizza Farm locations - as an example in both Yorkton and Saskatoon the Pizza Farms are located at the Monsanto Research farm. The children are bused out to the locations - put in groups and then rotate through the various agricultural education stations. In Saskatoon the stations were - Wheat/crop Protection, Canola, Soybeans/ Soil Conservation, Vegetables - planting, Herbs, Grow a Row, Dairy, Potash and Farm safety. The children would not only learn about where their food comes from, but also be able to plant seeds, which they will be able to harvest in the fall.

This has been a great project for SAASE to get involved in and we look forward to working with our partners on the Pizza Farm in 2018.









### Swift Current's Discover the Farm



The Swift Current 'Discover the Farm: A Farm Facts Experience' was held on April 27-29,2017 at the Stockade Building, Kinetic Park, Swift Current, Saskatchewan. This two day interactive program, now in its sixth year, is offered to school age children from Kindergarten to Grade 6. This is a great opportunity for the students from Swift Current and surrounding area to learn about farm animals, food production, and farm safety. Poultry, beef, crop production and safety aspects are included with the 12 stations - about 2 hours in length. Participating educators received resource activity packages.

Thirty teachers and 546 students learned about agriculture and safety through hands-on demonstrations. A variety of topics included large animal safety, First Aid, all about chickens and hatching of eggs, train safety, Saskatchewan Beef Industry was represented, Agriculture in the Classroom demonstrated seed growth, water safety and life jackets, a demonstration of potash mining, being physically active, preventing head injury, and interaction with exotic poultry and

animals. The Wymark Drylanders 4-H club assisted with set-up and take-down, as well as providing a cow and calf for observation.

Educational materials and sponsorship support was provided by the community and provincial organizations: Agriculture in the Classroom, the Swift Current Ag & Ex, Cypress Health Region, City of Swift Current, Saskatchewan Beef Association, SAASE, St John Ambulance, Farm Credit Company and Progressive Agriculture Safety. Teachers and parents are very encouraging about continuing this program, and have indicated the importance of informing students about where their food comes from and providing safety principles.

Teacher comments include:

"There was interesting facts presented at each of the stations – a very good experience'.

'Students felt involved and interacted freely with presenters';

'Information presented supplements what we are doing in the classroom'

'Seeing the animals, viewing the seed

growing process and the importance of safety in water and around railroads was excellent - thank-you!'

The informational displays are set up specifically for the Grades K- 6 classrooms. The teachers place students into interactive groups of 10-12 to take part in listening and participating in activities. The students were provided with time to interact with the exotic and farm animals, poultry and birds. These included donkeys, alpaca, reptiles, miniature cows, rabbits, ducks, geese. New this year was a Rabbit Show which encouraged young people to bring their bunnies for showing. They were judged on 5 categories and the expert judge, Shelley Eckart, instructed the participants on what to look for as the winners were chosen and one proclaimed grand champion.

This project also provides a learning environment while connecting Swift Current and area rural producers. Public interest continues to be strong as students, families, producers and consumers are offered the opportunity share and support





our growing agricultural community.

Over 1100 visitors attended on the Saturday as various Southern Saskatchewan and Alberta producers' brought in their exotic birds and animals, plus crafters exhibited their work in the trade show. This is a one of a kind event that takes place in Swift Current, and producers as well as consumers were highly pleased with the results. All acknowledged that this is a successful, worthy project.

## 700 Children Learn About Agriculture & Safety in Prince Albert





### **Agricultural Education**

The Prince Albert Exhibition and over 700 school children were learning all about agricultural education and safety on April 26th and 27th in Prince Albert. The 32 classes of children had an opportunity to learn about agriculture, where their food comes from and safety over the 2 days.

The Prince Albert Exhibition - their staff and volunteers run a full day program for 16 classes each day with 16 stations. They use 2 buildings - one of their barns, as well as their main hall for their stations. 8 of the classes start in the barn in the morning, while the other 8 are inside the main hall. Lunch is served for the whole group - they have a cookie auction and then the classes that were in the barn in the morning move into the main hall in the afternoon.

The stations that were located in the barn were - poultry, beef, tractor/pto safety, dairy, animal safety, sheep, swine and a light horse station. Inside the main hall the stations included Chemical Safety, SaskPower electrical safety station, ATV safety, first aid - EMT/Ambulance, horticulture, the Prince Albert Humane Society, water conservation, Ag in the Classroom grains and grasses, and Ag in the Classroom by products bingo.

Each of the stations were manned by volunteers or producer groups. SAASE helped out with SaskPower electrical safety display. The presentations for the children would last 10 - 12 minutes, with the groups moving on to the next station. Agricultural education has always been an important part of the Prince Albert Exhibition's programming, and they look forward to hosting over 700 children at next year's event.



### Premises Identification Premises Identification Premises ID Becomes a Requirement for **Livestock Traceability**

Over the past couple of years SAASE has been working with the Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture on getting SAASE members to get a Premises ID number if they host livestock on their grounds over the course of the year. The following is an article written by Provincial Livestock Specialist Melissa Hurst on the program.

Government of Saskatchewan needs your help with building a robust Premises identification (PID) database. PID is an important element in an effective traceability system. Registering your premises online is quick, easy and free, and now it's required. Since December 2016, PID has been a requirement for participating in provincial livestockrelated programs.

PID was established to plan for, control and prevent the spread of livestock diseases. PID also is being used as an early warning system notifying producers of natural disasters, such as a flood or fire, which could affect their animals or operations. Producers can also use traceability as a management tool. The ability to trace an animal throughout its life can provide many economic, environmental and social benefits.

We can easily see the benefits in the recent bovine tuberculosis situation. Officials were able to determine where the animals were located and potential movements occurring—live animal movements are a major transmission method for the spread of infectious agents.

As producers, you want to ensure you are in the best position possible to protect your cattle if a disease outbreak were to happen. Registering your premises allows for this. Saskatchewan can be in a better position to respond to disease outbreaks, and even prevent outbreaks, with a full database of information provided by producers. Registrants' information is kept private and only used in such emergencies.

The federal government fully supports a national tractability system. PID supports the traceability system by linking livestock to specific geographical locations, allowing officials to quickly contact the owners of those animals and dispatch appropriate resources in the event of a livestock disease outbreak.

A fully functional traceability system requires:

- 1. Animal Identification (RFID tag). In Canada, cattle, sheep and bison require radio frequency identification tags when transported outside of their herd of origin.
- Premises Identification (PID). Any physical land location associated with livestock, such as a farm, pasture, feedlot, auction mart, veterinary office and abattoir, should be assigned a unique identification number.
- Animal Movement. Documented movement information (manifests) must accompany all cattle shipments. In this way all animal movements can be followed.

PID numbers should be recorded on brand manifests and added to producers' Canadian Livestock Traceability System (also known as the Canadian Cattlemen's Identification Agency database) accounts when buying tags or age verifying. In the near future a PID number will be required to move cattle; producers are encouraged to register as soon as possible.

#### Frequently Asked Questions:

As a cattle producer is there a benefit to register each location where my herd could be located?

Yes, there is a benefit to have multiple premises in the PID system, particularly those away from your main site to ensure you are notified of an emergency in that specific area.

What does capacity mean and why is it important?

Capacity refers to the maximum number of animals (of each species) your premises will reasonably accommodate at any one time. In the event of an animal health emergency or natural disaster, officials need to know the maximum number of animals impacted, to help plan quantities of vaccinations, evacuation numbers or

### Safety Days Wrap up for the Spring

14 safety days in 12 communities that SAASE and our members have been part of have taken place to the end of June. Safety days have taken place in Spiritwood, Swift Current, Lloydminster, Meadow Lake, Humboldt, Prince Albert, Unity, Weyburn, Yorkton, Biggar, Kindersley, and North Battleford. To date over 4,000 children have gone through the safety days. In 2015 SAASE and it's members were part of 19 safety days in 17 communities around Saskatchewan. Over 500 volunteers and presenters devoted over 5,000 hours to teach almost 6,000 children about safety - we expect to be around those numbers by the time we are done with our safety days in 2017.

SAASE has continued to develop partnerships as we move along on the safety day program. In addition to the



















The activity book that we have been giving out to participants over the past 4 years is in the process of being redone. Safety pages on pipeline safety and railway safety have been added. The activity book has taken a little longer to finish, but it will be ready for our safety days in 2018. A big thanks to SaskPower, Viterra, Enbridge and CN for helping us out with the printing costs.

Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture, SaskPower, the Progressive Agriculture Foundation, Canadian Agricultural Safety Association and Community Initiatives Fund, SAASE has also been able to add some new partners to the group. We are now working with the Saskatchewan Safety Council, Prairie South School Division, Viterra, Enbridge, CN and Farm Credit

Our Agricultural Societies have had tremendous support from the schools in their communities, as well as their surrounding communities as thousands

of children attend our safety days. Topics for the stations that the children rotate through have been varied, as each safety day chooses which topics are most important for their areas.

Topics for the interactive stations have included ATV safety, firearm safety, animal safety - small and large, bicycle safety, internet, electrical, PTO, lawn mower, tractor, distracted/impaired driving, grain safety, first aid, chemical, pipeline, water safety, railway safety and fire safety.

As we finish up our safety day schedule for 2017 - safety days will be held in the following communities throughout the summer and into the fall - Kelvington, Asquith, LeRoy,



Maryfield and Moose Jaw. If you are interested in hosting a safety day this fall - there may be an opportunity - talk to Glen at the SAASE office to find out if it can be done. If you are interested in hosting a safety day for 2108, in order for it to be a Progressive Ag Safety Day it must be applied for before July 15. Talk to Glen at the SAASE office if you are interested.

Once again SAASE, in conjunction with the Progressive Agriculture Foundation and the Canadian Agricultural Safety Association will be hosting a Safety Day Coordinators workshop in Regina in the fall - if you are hosting a safety day in 2018 you must send a representative to the workshop. The Community Initiatives Fund (CIF) will be supporting the workshop by picking up the hotel, food and workshop costs. Your volunteers will also have their mileage costs picked up for the workshop. This workshop is enabling us to develop a network of safety day coordinators across the province - ensuring that we all host the best safety days that we can for the youth of Saskatchewan.





### Saskatchewan Beef Expo 2017

Prairieland Park Ag Centre hosted 89 4H members and their parents for a weekend of education and competition at the 4th Annual Saskatchewan Beef Expo, April 7th – 9th.

Our educational focus this year was safe, low-stress livestock handling. The ultimate goal is to reduce deaths and injuries in both handlers and their livestock. The livestock handling demo started with a presentation on the safe handling of livestock followed by a short video. The participants then watched a live demonstration on moving cattle by using pressure points through a series of outdoor pens. The grooming session focused on animal care and show preparation.



Evaluating beef animals for conformation and structural correctness was featured again this year with two industry experts instructing the participants. Once the session was complete the participants were required to judge a class of animals and provide oral reasons for their placements to the judges. This event allows for the participants to improve their public speaking skills, and learn what to look for when selecting animals for their own herd.

With the changes in the industry in terms of genetics, breeds and new technology, it is apparent that education will

be the cornerstone to ensure the stability of the beef industry in Saskatchewan. Judges Katie Wright and Virginia Peters each gave an overall summary at the end of the day, providing further advice and praising the participants for their good work.

On day 2 participants had the opportunity to participate in show ring competitions including Market Steer, Heifer and Showmanship classes. Saskatchewan Beef Expo continues to provide participants important education on the beef industry; team collaboration; and personal leadership skills. These participants are the future of Agriculture in Saskatchewan.
