As people become less and less involved with agriculture - educating our youth on where their food comes from has never been more important. Saskatchewan's Agricultural Societies and SAASE have always been involved with agricultural education - it is at the core of what we do. Over the last number of years SAASE has developed partnerships with government, corporate and other non-profit groups on agricultural education - in addition to the work that our Agricultural Societies do, SAASE also works on other agricultural education projects.

In addition to the work that SAASE does with Agribition and this year with Mosaic on the Memorial Cup, SAASE also works with numerous partners on Pizza Farms around Saskatchewan. The Pizza Farms give school children an opportunity for hands on learning about agriculture. The students rotate through a number of



agricultural education stations, and also have the opportunity to plant vegetables that would be put on a pizza. The children not only get to plant the seeds in the spring, but then they havest what they have planted in the fall.

This year SAASE worked with a number of groups to help out at some of the Pizza Farm locations. In addition to Mosaic, SAASE also worked with the Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture, Monsanto and Ag in the Classroom on the program. The Mosaic display was used in Yorkton and Moose Jaw. This has been a great project for SAASE to get involved in and we look forward to working with our partners on the Pizza Farm in 2019.





Ag Education

Ag Educa Prince Albert Exhibition Teaches 700 **Children about Agriculture and Safety**



The Prince Albert Exhibition and over 700 school children were learning all about agricultural education and safety on April 11th and 12th in Prince Albert. The 32 classes of children had an opportunity to learn about agriculture, where their food comes from and safety over the 2 days.

The Prince Albert Exhibition - their staff and volunteers run a full day program for 16 classes each day with 16 stations. They use 2 buildings - one of their barns, as well as their main hall for their stations. 8 of the classes start in the barn in the morning, while the other 8 are inside the main hall. Lunch is served for the whole group - they have an auction and then the classes that were in the barn in the morning move into the main hall in the afternoon.

Each of the stations were manned by volunteers or producer groups. SAASE helped out with SaskPower electrical safety display. The presentations for the children would last 10 - 12 minutes, with the groups moving on to the next station. Agricultural education has always been an important part of the Prince Albert Exhibition's programming, and they look forward to hosting over 700 children at next year's event.



Discover the Farm Swift Current Discovers the Farm

The Swift Current 'Discover the Farm: A Farm Facts Experience' was held on April 26-27,2018 at the Stockade Building, Kinetic Park, Swift Current, Saskatchewan. The two day interactive program, now in its seventh year, is offered to school age children from Kindergarten to Grade 6.26 teachers and 551 students took in the event, learning about agriculture and safety through hands-on demonstrations provided with time to interact with the exotic and farm animals, poultry and birds. These included donkeys, alpaca, zebus - miniature cows, rabbits, ducks, geese. The Rabbit Show, which encouraged young people to bring their rabbits for showing, was once again a popular event. Rabbits of all breeds and sizes were judged on five categories and the expert judge, Shelley Eckart, instructed the participants on what to look for as the winners were chosen and one proclaimed grand champion.

Venture Projects



Venture Project Funding Increased to \$60,000 for 2018 - September 1 Deadline



SAASE's Venture Project program has had a long history of providing seed money to Agricultural Societies and Exhibition to help out with new events or enhancing existing events. Each year SAASE allocates \$45,000 to the program out of the funding that is received through SaskLotteries.

SAASE has always promoted the program amongst our members and the board of Directors have always done their best to get as much money out to our members for eligible projects as possible. This past year there have been more Venture Project applications submitted then there have been for a number of years. At the most recent SAASE Board meeting in the beginning of June, there were a number of Venture Project applications submitted, with not enough money to go around. This will be the final year of the existing Venture Project Program - with the new program moving to one application date - December 1 - it was felt that for this year

SAASE would look at increasing the budget for Venture Projects. It appears that there will be some dollars left over in this year's administration budget, so with that the Board increased the Venture Project budget to \$60,000 from \$45,000.

As a result the decision was also made that Venture Project applications for 2018 would only be accepted to September 1. The reasoning being that with the new deadline of December 1 an application after September 1 could wait until the new program's December 1 deadline. If any Agricultural Societies have any projects that they are looking at submitting an application to the Venture Project Program they are encouraged to get them in quickly, as there is limited money left in the \$60,000 Venture Project budget for this 2018. If you have any questions or an idea for a Venture Project give Glen a call at the SAASE office.

2018 Farm Progress Show's Largest Ever

(Press Release from Evraz Place) The 2018 edition of Canada's Farm Progress Show, presented by Viterra, wrapped up on Friday, marking the show's first year in the International Trade Centre. The new \$37million facility housed 200 exhibitors and the first-ever Launch Pad stage where top agricultural retailers and manufacturers presented new products, innovations and inventions.

"We programmed the show this year knowing the new International Trade Centre would provide more opportunity to showcase the industry's best technology in an interactive setting," said Shirley Janeczko, Canada's



Farm Progress Show manager. "We had a record 22 Innovation Program entries this year and three major product launches from AGCO, Morris Industries and Salford Group. We provided a platform for these exhibitors to connect with buyers to share technology that continues to advance productivity in the ag sector."

The 41st edition of the show saw strong performance in domestic and international sales and leads generated, which contribute to the millions in economic impact the show drives locally and provincially. "The three-day event drew thousands of visitors to Regina, which in itself is a major economic gain," said Janeczko. "When you add in sales generated during and in the months following the show, the impact to our economy is outstanding."

Chris Bettschen, International Business Manager for Väderstad – a Swedish company that in recent years expanded operations into Canada – was one of the exhibitors who experienced another successful show. "The quality of customers we have at the show is always very high. We had a very good year again," said Bettschen. "We sold pieces (of equipment) right from our booth, and we have leads to pursue new sales afterwards. We'll be coming back to Canada's Farm Progress Show again next year and we're looking forward to it."

In addition to domestic sales and leads, the International Business Centre saw an estimated \$345M in sales for the three-day show. Nearly 700 registered international visitors and buyers from countries such as the USA, Russia, China, Ukraine and South Africa visited this year's show prepared to spend with Saskatchewan and Canadian manufacturers and exporters. "Canada's Farm Progress Show is known as one of the world's top shows for bringing together international buyers with our local companies," said Janeczko. "We often say to our exhibitors that their business is our business. We bring the world together to do business right here in Regina at Evraz Place."

Attendance this year was 34,853, and those who came through the gates were ready to do business. The business-to-business show is on pace to exceed last year's spending, which is the true determinant of its success. For 41 years, Canada's Farm Progress Show has brought together qualified buyers with manufacturers and dealers to showcase the newest innovation that makes our province and country leaders in the global agriculture industry.







Safety Days Wrap up for the Spring



Fourteen safety days in eighteen communities that SAASE and our members have been part of have taken place to the end of June. Safety days have taken place in Assiniboia, Swift Current, Lloydminster, Meadow Lake, Belle Plaine, Prince Albert, Unity, Weyburn, Yorkton, Biggar, Nipawin, and Outlook. To date over 4,000 children have gone through the safety days. In 2017 SAASE and it's members were part of twenty safety days in eighteen communities around Saskatchewan. Over 500 volunteers and presenters devoted over 5,000 hours to teach almost 6,000 children about safety - we expect to be around those numbers by the time we are done with our safety days in 2018.

SAASE has continued to develop partnerships as we move along on the safety day program. In addition to the Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture, SaskPower, the Progressive Agriculture Foundation, Canadian Agricultural Safety Association and Community Initiatives Fund, SAASE has also been able to add some new partners to the group. We are now working with the Saskatchewan Safety Council, Prairie South School Division, Viterra, Enbridge, CN and Farm Credit Canada.

Our Agricultural Societies have had tremendous support from the schools in their communities, as well as their surrounding communities as thousands of children attend our safety days. Topics for the stations that the children rotate through have been varied, as each safety day chooses which topics are most important for their areas.

Topics for the interactive stations have included ATV safety, firearm safety, animal safety - small and large, bicycle safety, internet, electrical, PTO, lawn mower, tractor, distracted/impaired driving, grain safety, first aid, chemical, pipeline, water safety, railway safety and fire safety.

As we finish up our safety day schedule for 2018 - safety days will be held in the following communities throughout the summer and into the fall - Canora, Mortlach, North Battleford, Humboldt, Eston and Moose Jaw. If you are interested in hosting a safety day this fall - there may be an opportunity - talk to Glen at the SAASE office to find out if it can be done. If you are interested in hosting a safety day for 2019, in order for it to be a Progressive Ag Safety Day, it must be applied for before July 15. Talk to Glen at the SAASE office if you are interested.

SAASE, in conjunction with the Progressive Agriculture Foundation and the Canadian Agricultural Safety Association will be hosting a Safety Day Coordinators workshop in Regina in

the fall - if you are hosting a safety day in 2019 you must send a representative to the workshop. The Community Initiatives Fund (CIF) will be supporting the workshop by picking up the cost of the hotel, food and workshop. Your volunteers will also have their mileage costs picked up for the workshop. This workshop is enabling us to develop a network of safety day coordinators across the province - ensuring that we all host the best safety days that we can for the youth of Saskatchewan.

Saskatchewan's Provincial Safety Day Program is recognized as one of the best in Canada - that is due to the tremendous work our Agricultural societies are doing in





their communities to organize them, as well as the support of the many volunteers, schools and businesses that are involved. Thanks to everyone for making a difference by working to keep our youth safe.
