The program will give our members the opportunity to apply for various event funding and will compliment our Venture Project Program. Because of the new Tourism program, Tourism Saskatchewan will not be adding the additional \$50,000 to our Venture Project program as our members can now apply directly to Tourism Saskatchewan. Thanks to Ken for braving the cold and coming to our convention and thanks to Tourism Saskatchewan for the funding they supplied over the past four years for our Venture Project program. SAASE looks forward to our continuing partnership with Tourism Saskatchewan in the future.

The Community Vitality Program has also proven to be an excellent program offered through the CIF for our members. SAASE's Agricultural Societies have accessed almost \$400,000 for improving their facilities since the program began. Tracey Mann from the CIF also did a presentation at our convention outlining the funding opportunities available through the Community Initiatives Fund. Take a look at the Community Spaces and Places program - there are not many programs that we can apply to that will allow us to access funding for small capital projects and repairs - this is one of them. Thanks to Tracey for giving us her time at the convention.

The SaskPower Clean Team program has been renewed for 2014, but this will be the last year of involvement from SaskPower. For the past 12 years this program has made a huge difference in 35 of our communities around Saskatchewan by supporting youth and community groups, as well as making a positive impact on the environment. Thank you to SaskPower for your support through those years and the SAASE Board of Directors looks forward to developing a new partnership on this great program.

The partnership with the Ministry of Agriculture on the Farm Safety Days is very exciting and continues to grow. 7 Farm Safety Days were held in 2013, and there is a possibility that up to 19 may be held in 2014. Keeping our kids safe around the farm is a huge priority, and if your Agricultural Society has not hosted a Farm Safety Day, I would encourage you to take a look at it. Thanks to the Ministry of Agriculture for their continued support and to our partners from Progressive Agriculture and the Canadian Agricultural Safety Association for all their help.

A total of seven Honorary Life Memberships were awarded including – Gloria Perkins and George Belchamber – nominated by the Nipawin Exhibition, Robert Sproule – nominated by the Melfort Agricultural Society, Edna McCall – nominated by the Abernethy Agricultural Society, Diane Hrechuk – nominated by the Elstow Agricultural Society and Marion and Rollie Nordell – nominated by the Turtleford Agricultural Society.

SAASE members have accessed almost \$400,000 in funding to assist with small capital projects, repairs and celebrating events through the Community Initiatives Fund's (CIF) - Community Vitality Program. Tracey Mann - Executive Director for the CIF - gave a presentation on the various programs available to our Agricultural Societies and the opportunities that exist for funding. The new Community Spaces and Places program is up and running for the next 2 years, with the first deadline being April 1 - if you have a small capital project, or have some repairs that need to be done you are certainly encouraged to apply.

Rudy Friesen and Doug Kryzanowski from the Lethbridge Exhibition did a presentation entitled Everything Changes When You Do. The Lethbridge Exhibition has essentially changed the way they do everything over the last number of years and continue to work at it. Doug and Rudy gave us an overview of what they have been doing and the

challenges and successes they have had. A big thanks goes out to Doug and Rudy for giving their time to come out and present at this year's SAASE convention.

The SaskEnergy Volunteer Champions Awards Luncheon took place, with many of our volunteers being recognized - check out the article in this newsletter on the awards luncheon and the volunteers that were recognized.

After lunch Dave White from Synergy Solutions did a presentation on the Cultural pilot project that SAASE did with the communities of Biggar, Moose Jaw and Swift Current. Tracey Stevenson from Swift Current, Lisa Haynes from Biggar reported on how their projects are going, as well as Glen Duck did an update on the Moose Jaw project.

The SAASE Annual Meeting finished up the convention. During the meeting the decision was made that Moose Jaw will host the SAASE 2015 convention and the Nipawin Exhibition will host the 2016 convention. Thanks to SaskPower for 12 Years of Clean Team

SaskPower announced in November that they would be partnering on the Clean Team for 2014, but have made the decision that 2014 will be the last year that they will be involved with the program. The Clean Team has been tremendously successful over the past 12 years - the program has grown from initially 10 Clean Team locations to a total of 35 Clean Team locations for 2014. Over the course of the 12 years the program has been recognized both nationally and internationally by the Canadian Association of Fairs and Exhibitions (CAFE), as well as the International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE) for innovation and community involvement.

Over the course of the 12 years SaskPower has committed over \$500,000 to the Clean Team and the community groups that have worked with our Agricultural Societies. In addition to the 35 Agricultural Societies over 60 youth and community groups have benefited from the SaskPower Clean Team. The youth and community groups, who are the Clean Team, have been able to raise much needed funds for their continued programming, but more importantly this program has given their members a great deal of responsibility and allowed them to grow as individuals within their communities. In addition to the

contributions to youth, community and community groups, there has been a tremendous impact on the environment. Over the 12 years of the program over 41,000 lbs of material will have been diverted from the landfills, and over 260,000 lbs of trash was collected at community events across Saskatchewan. Over 9 million people have seen the Clean Team in action at Saskatchewan events. SAASE will be looking for a new partner to take over the program, but SAASE, our Board of Directors, Agricultural Societies, Community groups and the 35 communities involved in the Clean Team would like to give a big thankyou to SaskPower for 12 great years.



Nominate Someone Now for the Saskatchewan Agricultural Hall of Fame

The Saskatchewan Agricultural Hall of Fame was founded in 1970 with the mandate to formally and publicly recognize persons who, in the course of their residence in Saskatchewan, made significant contributions to the welfare and improvement of Saskatchewan agriculture, and to a better way of life for the farm family. The Hall of Fame is



located in Saskatoon at the Western Development Museum. SAASE was one of the founding sponsors when the Hall of Fame was incorporated in 1972, and holds a seat on the Board of Directors. The SAASE representatives who have sat on the Board of Directors over the years include: Ron Gallaway, Estevan; Mrs. Elaine Poirer, Redvers, 1987-89; Dale Gibson, Conquest, 1990-93; Vic Sommerfeld, Saskatoon, 1993-1995; Ken Bowman, 1996-1999; Bruce Hobin, Saskatoon, 2000-2004; Maurice Neault, Saskatoon, 2005-2008; Vern Featherstone, Perdue, 2009-present.

Each year outstanding individuals who have devoted their lives to Saskatchewan agriculture are nominated. There are various categories that the applicant can be nominated in. The categories are as follows:

- University;
- Government (Civil Servant)
- Political

- Farm Organization (Lobbyist)
- Improved Farm Practice and/or Product
- Quality of Rural Living;
- Agribusiness

Those nominated must have contributed in accordance with the purpose of the SAHF. The purpose of the SAHF is: "Aim to formally and publicly recognize persons who, in the course of their residence in Saskatchewan, made significant contributions to the welfare and the improvement of Saskatchewan agriculture, and to a better way of life for the farm family."

- Persons must have made their contribution beyond the local community level and general enhancement and improvement of their local community's way of life.
- Nominees must have contributed significantly and made a lasting impact at the provincial level.

National and/or international contributions enhance eligibility.

- Nominees can be either deceased or living.
- Only individuals may be nominated (as opposed to pairs or groups such as husband-wife; father-son; mother-daughter) in one field of achievement.
- An active Director or an appointed Advisor to the Board are ineligible for induction into the SAHF.
- Canadian Agricultural Hall of Fame Inductees from Saskatchewan go on the SAHF nominee list, but are not automatically inducted into the SAHF.

SAASE would like to thank the Hall of Fame for all the work it does in recognizing these outstanding individuals.

SAASE/Tourism Saskatchewan's Venture Project Program Undergoes Changes

Over the past 4 years the Ministry of Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport - Tourism Saskatchewan have partnered with SAASE on expanding the Venture Project program. Each year an additional \$50,000 was added to assist in the development of new events/programs, enhancing existing events, as well as for the development of new Agricultural Societies and the development of communities. The program was tremendously successful with the seed money being used for many successful Agricultural Society projects over the past 4 years.



Earlier this year Tourism Saskatchewan announced a new event hosting strategy. As a result SAASE members will be able to apply for funding directly from Tourism Saskatchewan for community events. The event funding is available in 4 separate streams - Community Annual Events, National and International Events, Marquee Annual Events, and Special Tourism Products. Go to www.industrymatters.com to get the criteria for each category of funding. The funding through Tourism Saskatchewan will allow SAASE members the opportunity to access more funding for eligible events than was available through the previous expanded Venture Project program. Ken Dueck from Tourism Saskatchewan did a presentation at this year's SAASE convention outlining the new program,

as well as the opportunities the program will present to SAASE's members. There are 3 deadlines per year, and if you are looking at an event that fits the Tourism Saskatchewan criteria you are encouraged to get the application in early. The 3 deadline dates are - March 31, August 31 and November 30.

SAASE's Venture Project Program will have a few changes to it. The funding available through the SAASE program will revert back to the \$45,000 it was prior to Tourism Saskatchewan's involvement 4 years ago. Those Agricultural Societies receiving funding through Tourism Saskatchewan for an event will not be eligible to receive funding from SAASE's Venture Project program for that same

event funded through Tourism .

In order to give SAASE's Board of Directors a better opportunity to review the Venture Project applications there will be 3 SAASE Venture Project deadlines introduced. They are January 1, May 1 and September 1. These dates correspond with the SAASE Board meetings. As far as forwarding the funds - 75% of the approved funding will be forwarded once the project has been completed, with the remaining 25% being awarded after a presentation on the project has been done at the SAASE annual convention. If you have any questions, or would like to get some feedback on your project give the SAASE office a call.



SAASE and the Perdue Ag. Society to Partner on Board Governance Workshop

Lisa Hardy and Tim Carson from the Alberta Association of Agricultural Societies and Exhibitions will be conducting the seminar.

Governance is not a mystical creature sought after like a unicorn, or the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow. Governance refers to all the processes of governing. It relates to processes and decisions that seek to define actions, grant power, and verify performance. Whether you are a small not-for-profit, an Agricultural Society or municipal government, understanding governance and how effective your organization's processes are will impact success.

Lisa Hardy and Tim Carson will bring to life the "Board Governance Guidebook". A resource created to increase the awareness of key elements of quality governance and what it means to you and your organization. Throughout this multi media interactive presentation, this dynamic duo, from the Alberta Association of Agricultural Societies, will discuss the many key components that effectively lead organizations and share their experience and humor in what goes right, and what can go horribly wrong.

Cost of the workshop is \$25/ person, which includes your workshop materials, lunch and refreshments. 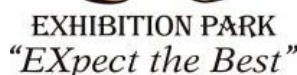
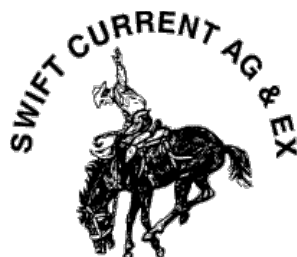

Saskatchewan Burrowing Owl Centre Big Success in 2013

One of the initial Venture Project ever approved by SAASE was for the Burrowing Owl Interpretive Centre in Moose Jaw on the Moose Jaw Exhibition grounds. Since then it has become the Saskatchewan Burrowing Owl Interpretive Centre and has expanded both its operations and programming. Below is an article submitted by the Moose Jaw Exhibition on what happened in 2013, as well as where the Centre is going in 2014.

The Centre kicked off the opening to our 2013 season with a Family Fun Day. The weather was perfect and everyone who attended enjoyed a fun filled afternoon of hotdogs, a children's craft table, petting zoo, bouncy castle, and of course the star attraction – the owls!! The afternoon was sponsored by SaskEnergy and we hope that with their continued support we can make this Family Fun Day an annual event.

During our visitor season which is from the May to September long weekends we hosted close to 3100 in-house visitors. We hosted visitors from across the province, Canada, the United States, and even the world with visitors from Korea, Singapore, the United Kingdom, Australia and New Zealand stopping by to visit with our owls!! Our Owls on Tour program was busier than ever this past year as well; we travelled to 37 schools around the province visiting with nearly 2000 students. We also participated in several summer day camps, special events at some of the Provincial Parks (Buffalo

Pound, Sask Landing, and Pike Lake), as well as a couple of Expo/Trade fairs in the province.

One of the most exciting events to happen this past year was the arrival of 3 new Burrowing Owls. These 2 females and 1 male came to us through the exchange program that we have developed in conjunction with Manitoba Burrowing Owl Conservation. These owls became even more special when one of the females and the male paired up for the breeding season and produced 6 healthy owlets! We began the imprinting process with 2 of these young owlets; Cricket and Ko'Ko. Both of these little owls have some big shoes to fill – Cricket will be taking over the space left in our education program when we retired Trooper and Ko'Ko is going to be the first ambassador owl for the Manitoba Burrowing Owl Conservation program!

The 2014 season is going to be an exciting one here at the Saskatchewan Burrowing Owl Interpretive Centre as we are beginning to implement the plans to build and expand the Centre. These plans include a new winter home for our ambassador owls, a medical/treatment room, a large display area as well as a winter viewing area. These improvements and expansion will not only make the care and maintenance of our residents easier and safer, but it will also allow the Centre to accommodate visitors throughout the year thus increasing the number of people that we can reach with our educational programs.
