Daniel Frazerwas nominated by the Maryfield Agricultural Society. He graduated from the Maryfield High School in June and will be attending the University of Saskatchewan in September 2008. Daniel has been accepted into the College of Engineering and has plans on becoming a civil engineer.

Daniel was very active throughout his high school career. He acted as Treasurer in 2008, President in 2007, and Vice President in 2006 on the Maryfield School Council. He was also the Grad Class President for 2008. He has coached and supervised young athletes and was the coach



of the Maryfield Junior Boys volleyball team. He also helped with refereeing, umpiring and scorekeeping from 2004 - 2007. He has been involved in the Missoula Children's Theatre and had the lead role in 2007, and was a participant in 2003 and 2005.

Daniel has been very involved in athletics. He was a member of the Saskatchewan volleyball team and participated in the 17 and under Western Canada Games in Edmonton in 2007, and 16 and under Western Elite Championships. He was a member of the Brandon Volleyball Club and competed in the National Volleyball Championships in May 2008. He was also captain of the Maryfield senior boys' team from 2005-2007. He has played hockey from 1996 right up to 2008 with the Wawota Flyers, and from 2006 to 2008 with the Redvers Midget Rockets. Daniel has competed on a provincial level with Track and Field in the long jump and triple jump, as well as cross-country running. He has also been a district champion in badminton, as well as competing in district golf over the past four years. Daniel has been involved in the Maryfield School intramural program from 1997 - 2008, as both participant and official.

On top of all the activities that Daniel has been involved in he has also worked within the community as far as volunteering at the Maryfield Curling Club and the Maryfield Recreation Board. He has also volunteered with the Maryfield Community Council by attending monthly meetings and helping to promote school spirit. Saskatoon Exhibit: AG-EXperience

Agriculture made its return to the 2008 Saskatoon Exhibition with a new exhibit called the AG-EXperience.

Prairieland Park, in partnership with leading industry stakeholders, developed this 10,000 square foot display to celebrate Saskatchewan agriculture. Interactive stations provide a fun, educational, hands-on environment for people to learn about the value and impact of agriculture and food production on their daily lives.

Phase One of the project features the beef, dairy, poultry and pork industries and include live animals on display to compliment the interactive stations. Fair-goers had the opportunity to learn about food production, nutrition, animal care, the effect of agriculture on the environment, and career options in the agriculture industry.

Prairieland Park was very fortunate to also include in the AG-EXperience Agrium's interactive exhibit "Seed Survivor". Seed Survivor is an integral part of the Calgary Stampede's Ag-tivity in the city and Agrium does not normally send this exhibit to other venues. However, when Agrium learned about Prairieland Park's AG-EXperience exhibit, they were convinced that the project was worthy of Seed Survivor.

The Farm Animal Council also participated in the AG-EXperience with their interactive display and a new Puppet Show. "Having the opportunity to be part of Prairieland Park's AG-EXperience served the Farm Animal Council of Saskatchewan (FACS) extremely well. Not only did people visit our booth and test their knowledge with our interactive video game, our puppet theatre premier 'Tales from the FACS Farm' was enjoyed by many youngsters on Share the Fair Day," FACS Executive Director Adele Buettner said.

The AG-EXperience interactive displays will be utilized throughout the year during Prairieland's agriculture shows as a component of the School Tours Program.

Nokomis SK Celebrated its 100th Anniversary




Home Coming Weekend August 1 - 3, 2008

The showcase featured four of Saskatchewan's finest Country Music Artists who traveled from all over Saskatchewan to perform for the homecoming crowd. She developed this stage so Saskatchewan singers would not only have a stage to perform from, but an opportunity to build new fans from the audiences that see the show. This is a new stage and it takes a tremendous amount of promotion to get this publicized. Jack and Bruce also work as studio sessions players and can be heard on JJ Guy's CD "Nothin But Blues Skies" which also received Saskatchewan radio play. Chris Henderson, from Estevan, was the final performer of the day. Chris is both a song writer and performer, and entertains audiences with his band all over Saskatchewan. His accomplishments include the single release, "The Difference You Make" in 2006 which received radio play, and he was a "CKRM Talent Search" finalist in 2006. Chris returned from Nashville earlier this year where he recorded his first full length album, "You Don't Scare Me", produced by Sean Hogan in the Gil Grand studio.
