SAASE and the Canadian Fair industry lost a very dear friend on Wednesday, July 13th. Moe Neault passed away of a heart attack at his home. Moe was a SAASE Board Member for many years, as he served as Prairieland Park's representative on the SAASE Board. He was committed to the fair industry in Saskatchewan, and was always there helping out the SAASE board with suggestions, as well as helping at the convention. He worked hard for the Saskatchewan and Canadian fair industry even when he was elected to Saskatoon City Council in 2003. Between his comittments to the City of Saskatoon and Prairieland Park he was still able to make time for SAASE. Below is an article that appeared on the CBC website talking about Moe and his contributions:

Saskatoon city councillor Maurice (Moe) Neault is being remembered as a "family man" with a deep sense of community. Neault, who was elected in Ward 3 in 2003, died of a heart attack at his home Wednesday around 2:15 a.m., Mayor Don Atchison told reporters Wednesday morning. "He not only walked the walk, he did what he believed in all the time," Atchison said. Atchison credited Neault with growth in Saskatoon's west end, including the Blairmore suburban centre area, and the Hampton Village neighbourhood. "We were told we wouldn't have another residential development on the west end of the city," Atchison said. "(We do) because

of his belief in people who live in the area. . . . (It's not just) what he believed in but (he) actually was able to fulfil his visions and dreams. It's so unfortunate that we lost him today." Neault, 59, was born and raised in Saskatoon. He is survived by his wife Sandra, children Nicole and Aaron, and four grandchildren. On his City of Saskatoon biography, Neault described his wife of 37 years as "his best friend" and said their four grandchildren "are the love of their lives." Neault worked for years for the Saskatoon Prairieland Exhibition, serving as program manager and marketing and business development manager. He started with Prairieland in 1991. Before that, he was a door-todoor milkman for the Co-op, moved to Kamloops as a floor installer, came back to Saskatoon to work for Weston Bakeries in a truck-to-store capacity, Hostess Potato Chips and then joined Rothmans's Pall Mall, in

Community Vitality Fund Community Vitality Fund Community Vitality Program Deadline Approaches

The Community Vitality Program deadline for applications is quickly approaching, and if you are thinking about applying; now is the time. Deadline for applications is October 1, 2011. Projects funded from the last deadline by the Community Vitality Program were announced on June 15th, and many SAASE members benefited from that funding announcement. A total of 9 agricultural societies, or groups connected to agricultural societies received funding totalling over \$115,000. The funding is for small capital projects and will make a tremendous difference for the facilities of those agricultural societies. Tracy Mann - Executive Director of the CIF ran an excellent workshop at the SAASE convention regarding the program, as well as how to write an effective grant proposal. The results were tremendous as 9 projects were approved. Hopefully SAASE members can build on that and get some more great applications in for the next deadline.

The 9 projects that were approved were very diverse and are good examples of

what the program has been set up to accomplish. The following agricultural society projects were approved:

- The Big Muddy Stampede Association in Bengough received \$5,502 to upgrade the community arena, which is located on the Bengough ag. society's land.
- The Kelvington ag. society received \$10,000 to upgrade and construct new ball diamonds.
- The Melfort ag. society received \$16,920 to replace their roof on their exhibit hall, office and youth activity center.
- 4. The Melville and District Agri-Park received \$26,000 for upgrades to their main community hall.
- 5. The Moose Mountain Rodeo Association, which works with the Kennedy ag society received \$9,750 to upgrade the rodeo grounds and buildings used for the rodeo and fair.
- The Perdue ag. society received \$10,000 to upgrade their rodeo arena.
- Saskatoon Prairieland Park received \$20,000 to help in the construction of new washroom facilities near their grandstand.
- The Shand ag. society received \$3,000 to renovate and upgrade their concession.
- The Swift Current Ag. and Ex. received \$15,000 to add a new kitchen and concession facility to Doc's Town.

Announced in May 2010, CIF's Community Vitality Program is responding to community priorities by helping volunteer and non-profit organizations deliver community projects for the benefit of Saskatchewan residents. "This program is very well received by Saskatchewan communities," Tracey Mann, CIF Executive Director said. "Volunteer leaders, especially those of smaller communities, tell us how critical these small capital grants are to repair or update their gathering areas, or to celebrate community accomplishments. We hope even more communities become involved through our programs."

The Community Vitality Program has two components: *Small Capital* and *Community Pride Projects and Events*. Small capital projects may involve upgrading rinks and community halls, even improving accessibility for residents. Projects that enhance community pride involve special events projects such as community anniversaries and volunteer recognition.

The CIF is a Special Purpose Fund created through *The Saskatchewan Gaming Corporation Act* and governed by a volunteer board appointed through the Ministry of Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport. The CIF offers grant programs for community-led projects that benefit children, youth and families in Saskatchewan.

If there has been a project that you have been looking at doing now is the ideal time to see if you can access funding to get it done. You can go online to take a look at the approved projects, as well as to download the application. Go to www.cifsask.org for all the information that you need. Remember the deadline is October 1st. This is a tremendous opportunity to get some funding to help get those upgrades done.

• The secretary in 1911 was F.J.Batute. The various events and projects the Ag. Society has been involved in has included countless number of volunteers who gave their time over the years.





1980, setting up shop in the building which has since become the offices of the Meewasin Valley Authority. He coached hockey, minor baseball, and softball, and served as vice-president of the Saskatoon Minor Hockey Association. He also managed Harold Latrace Arena when it opened in 1989. Coun. Myles Heidt, a longtime friend, said Neault was a "family man" and a communitarian. Councillors and the city hall community are "in disbelief" over the death, he said. "He was like a pit bull," Heidt said. "He had a way with politicians of senior levels of government that nobody could touch."



Moe absolutely loved the Saskatoon Exhibition and everything about it, so it was only fitting that Prairieland Park named the main walkway down the midway Moe Neault Way. This is a tremendous loss to the fair industry and the City of Saskatoon. Moe will be missed.



Logan Scharf - nominated by the Vanscoy and District Agricultural Society



The SAASE Venture Project program is a program that encourages agricultural societies to try new events and programs. The Moose Jaw Exhibition saw an opportunity to partner with a local organization to bring a world class event to Moose Jaw. SAASE supported this great event through the Venture Project program. As a result the Moose Jaw Exhibition played host to the 2011 IPF World Junior Powerlifting Championships from August 29 - September 4.

The Powerlifting Championships brought over 425 athletes and coaches representing 32 countries to compete in Moose Jaw at this prestigious event. Over the course of the week the lifting featured numerous world record lifts. The championships are made up of 3 seperate events the squat, bench press and dead lift. Each competitor has 3 attempts in each event, with the best lift from each one being counted. As well as medals being presented in each individual category there are overall winners in each weight category.

The local organizing committee did an excellent job in welcoming the world.

George Fowler -Moose Jaw Exhibition Manager - had a special interest in the event. Not only was he part of the organizing committee and manager of the facility, but his daughter Rhaea also competed in the event. Rhaea has competed in numerous world championships representing Canada all over the world, but she saved her best for her last junior competition and in



front of her home crowd. Below is a press release from the event.

Rhaea Fowler ended her Junior Powerlifting career September 3 by winning the overall gold medal in the +84kg event at the Moose Jaw Exhibition Co. Convention Centre. The first event was squat, where Fowler placed third with a squat at 230 kg (507 lb). The bench press was Rhaea's

best event; where she won the event after lifting 157.5kg on her final attempt. Fowler led the competition going into the deadlift, and the overall world championship wouldn't be decided until the final lift. Fowler deadlifted 185kg, 190kg, and then 195kg on her final attempt. Russia's Olga Tikomirova tried a deadlift of 217.5kg for the win, but came up short, sending the crowd into an uproar.
