# **Saskatoon Berry Festival a Big Success**



The Saskatoon Berry Festival was held in Mortlach on June 27th, with over 3,000 people attending this year's show. The award winning festival was a big hit. SAASE had the Mosaic Potash display set up in the trade show area, with many adults and children coming by to learn all about potash or share their stories. The Saskatoon Berry Festival is one of the many successful examples of SAASE's Venture Project program. Tourism Saskatchewan's Saskatchewanderer took in the event and posted this story on their website

Mortlach's Saskatoon Berry Festival For one day a year, the town of Mortlach grows from a population of 300 people to more than 3000. Having become famous for their Saskatoon Berry Festival over the past eight years, the small town welcomes people from all over Saskatchewan and even as far as Alberta and Manitoba.

The event, which won Saskatchewan Tourism's Community Event of the Year Award in 2014, is a combined celebration of community and Saskatoon berries, the nutrient-rich fruit that the City of Saskatoon is named after.

It's set up like a block party with arts and crafts vendors down Main Street and it all kicks off with a pancake breakfast. Later in the morning, a parade of more than 30 floats takes over the streets with antique farm machinery, classic cars, and Morty, the Moose Jaw Warrior's mascot, taking part.

Throughout the afternoon there are children's games and wagon rides. I took on Moose Jaw RCMP's Cpl. Jeff Henderson in a friendly competition at the Pedal Tractor Farm, racing around a pylon. I left him in the dust, but he claims he would win in a re-match.

Easily my favourite part was a slice of the tasty Saskatoon pies with ice cream made by Prairie Berries from Keeler, Sask. There was also live musical entertainment throughout the day. Artists such as Tami Elliot, Mark Penner, and folk band Sweet Saturday performed throughout the afternoon. In the evening, five-piece rock band The Strutt performed with The Eldorado Band headlining until midnight.

Festival-goers off all ages enjoying the folk music of Sweet Saturday. As a first time visitor to this friendly town, it quickly became clear to me that Mortlach has a lot to offer in the way of good food, good people, and good times whether you're visiting for the festival or any time of year.

they not only become riders but ambassadors of goodwill. Working through a unique medium, they promote the RCMP's image throughout Canada and the world. RCMP members only remain with the Musical Ride for two years with half transferring out each year which ensures an annual rotation of approximately one third (33%) of the riders.

Today, in keeping with tradition, the Musical Ride is performed by a full troop of thirty-two riders and horses, plus the member in charge. The Musical Ride consists of the execution of a variety of intricate figures and cavalry drill choreographed to music. Demanding utmost control, timing and coordination, these movements are formed by individual horses and riders, in two's, four's and eight's at the trot and at the canter. Months of training, practice and many kilometres/miles around the riding school make horse and rider one. The horses must not only appear in the Musical Ride, in parades, special events, but also have the ability to travel and adapt to different environments, not to mention, hours of petting and photo-taking that the horses must patiently endure.

Over the past year the whole display or part of the display has been at Canadian Western Agribition, SAASE's annual convention in Moose Jaw, Prince Albert's Chillin' for Agriculture, Swift Current's Discover the Farm, Ag in the City in Saskatoon, Lloydminster's colonial Days, Maryfield's 100th Fair, the Queen City Ex in Regina, the Saskatoon Ex, and Battleford's Territorial Days. The SaskPower electrical safety display has also been touring the 13 safety days that have taken place to date. This fall is gearing

# Safety Day Coordinators Workshop October 5/6 in Regina



SAASE in partnership with the Progressive Agriculture Foundation, Canadian Agricultural Safety Association and the Community Initiatives Fund will be hosting a Safety Day Coordinator training on October 5-6 in Regina. The training workshop will be taking place in the Canadian Western Agribition Lounge, which is located in the Canada Centre Building on the Regina Exhibition grounds. The workshop is run by Bernard Geshkie from the Progressive Agriculture Foundation and will not only talk about how to run a safety day, but will also go through all the resources available through Progressive Ag and the Canadian Agricultural Safety Association. If you are hosting a safety day in 2016 you should have someone present for the training. Lunch will be served and the workshop will begin at 12:30 on October 5 and run until 4:00 pm on October 6. Through our partnership with the Community Initiatives Fund (CIF) we are able to provide 1 night hotel - the hotel is the Regina Airport Days Inn (same one as last year). In addition to the hotel we are also able to provide registration for 2 people/Agricultural Society, as well as the food cost at the workshop. This training is allowing us to develop a network of trained safety coordinators around the province, ensuring that our safety day program continues to grow. Board Governance and Bylaws. The feedback we received from that presentation was very positive, and in fact the decision was made at the convention to have Tim do a workshop for us in Nipawin. The workshop will be an extension of Tim's presentation last year - he will talk about how we can make our Board of Directors and Agricultural Societies more effective. Tim has been working with Board Governance for years and is an excellent resource - we are very lucky to have Tim coming back and everyone is encouraged to send a representative from their Agricultural Society.

The workshop will take place in the Legion Hall on Friday February 26. Lunch will be served at 12 noon and then we will move into the workshop immediately after, with it finishing up between 4:30 and 5. Registration for the convention will begin at 5:30. There is no cost for the workshop, but you must register in advance. The convention registration packages will be sent out and be available online in November, so make sure that you check off the box to let us know if you will also be attending the Board Governance workshop.

The other area on Friday that we are going to focus on is judging. There has been a great deal of concern over the past couple of years regarding the availability of judges, as well as getting new judges involved to help us out at our fairs and shows. An additional workshop that we will be hosting on the Friday afternoon is essentially a train the trainer workshop for judges. If you have anyone interested in becoming a judge, or anyone who wants to know what it takes to train a judge, this workshop is for you.





There will be a number of expert judges in various disciplines who will go through not only how to judge the different areas, but also what you can do, and where you can look to line up and find or train qualified judges. A judging standards manual will be made available to everyone who attends. The judging workshop will take place on Friday February 26th in the morning. We will meet for breakfast at 8 am and the finish up in time for those who also want to attend the Board Governance workshop in the afternoon. Once again this workshop is available at no charge, but you must register for the workshop. You will be able to register for the judging workshop on the convention registration form, as well as online.

The Nipawin Exhibition have got a very special night planned for us for the Friday night host night - we look forward to seeing what they have planned.

Saturday morning Liz Roberts from Liz Roberts and Associates will be doing a presentation on Agricultural Societies as Community Developers. Agricultural Societies have always been a place where the community gathers to learn, work and play. For



over 100 years Ag Society events have brought people together to learn about agriculture, food safety and other community values. 
Liz's session will look at how Ag Societies can continue to fulfill their mandate as community builders and facilitators and be value-added partners in helping to build a desired future for their organization and

#### Territorial Days fun for all ages First Person Exploits into the Unknown

I've never been able to stomach big roller coasters. I don't know what it is, I know they're safe, I know there's no danger involved, but it's just that mental hurdle of saying, "Just do it," that always gets in the way.

I didn't realize Northwest Territorial Days involved a full-on amusement park with rides and all the greasy fair food you could possibly want.

When I was first asked to go take some pictures at the fair, I didn't know what I was getting myself into. I found myself walking around with a permanent smile on my face looking at all the things you don't normally see around here, especially for myself being from up north.

There is a travelling fair that would come to Whitehorse for about a week for the past few summers, and it was always packed because people from up there don't get to experience something like that unless they fly or drive to Vancouver. Wednesday I went to hang out with the new Access 7 camera girl since I had nothing better to do. We had a great time watching the Saskatchewan Express performers



take to the stage as they sang and danced songs from the 1940s to today. We mimicked their dance moves as they performed and got a few strange looks from the people around us, but it was incredibly entertaining. It reminded me of when I was in a musical in Grade 12, something I'm not ashamed to admit. Being on stage and performing lines and songs with no stumbles is a great feeling. Not to mention the ovation at the conclusion of each show.

Thursday came around and I was tasked with taking some pictures of the chariot and chuckwagon races that were happening at the fair. I thought it was the perfect time to hop on some rides in between the two. When it came to the races, I was a little in awe of the speed and control these drivers had over their horses, chariots and wagons. When I think of chariot races, I think of Roman Empire type races. I also couldn't believe they were all wearing jeans considering it was over 30°C.

I walked around the fair while waiting for my friend to arrive so I didn't have to go on the rides by myself. Naturally, I got a bag of mini donuts and watched the woman pour about seven pounds of sugar on top before she handed them to me. The treadmill was put to good use at the gym this weekend. I wandered over to the animal presentation that was going on and saw a jaguar for the first time in my life.

"That is one brave soul," I thought to myself while watching the worker hold food in front of the jaguar's face. They also had a regular house cat in the cage and had both cats perform the same tricks. See, kids, jaguars are completely acceptable house pets! While demolishing my bag of donuts and watching





the display, a small child in a stroller in front of me was staring at my donuts, opening and closing her hand in a "give me" motion. Call me evil, but I laughed as I finished the bag while she watched. Besides, I don't think her mom would have been happy if a random man gave her child a donut.

After my friend arrived it was time to hop on some rides. As we walked around the fair deciding which one to try first, a girl who looked to be about 13 years old got off a ride and promptly had her lunch come back up. I laughed and my friend turned around and tried not to have the same thing happen to her. The first ride we went on was called Orbiter, which involved a lot of spinning. You know that feeling you get in your stomach when a plane starts to descend? Multiply that by about 10 and that's how I felt on that ride. The thoughts in my head switch between "this was a terrible idea" and "this is so much fun" whenever I'm on rides at amusement parks. I can never seem to keep the switch fully turned to the fun side.

The Perdue Agricultural Society took on a huge challenge by putting on a bull riding event this year. It was definitely a new event and with that the committee put in a Venture Project application, It was approved, as the purpose of the program is to assist in getting new events up and running by supplying seed money to relieve some of the financial risk. #### Perdue Bull Riding a Huge Hit

It may be a small town but Perdue has a lot of heart, which was demonstrated during their bull riding event. The Perdue Bull Riding was held on the evening of July 25 at the Perdue South Ag Grounds in the large sand arena.

"This event was put on by our Ag Society basically to help raise funds for our community and for the Ag Society to do improvements on the grounds," organizer Annaleigh LeBruno said. "We are a pretty agricultural-based community and bull riding tends to bring a lot of people out,

so that's why we chose to go this route."

The event was a huge success, with more than 400 people cramming into the space to see the cowboys try for their eight seconds. A smaller ring was created inside the large sand arena, with bleachers set up around the ring for spectators.

"I do know that the stands were packed and there was basically standing room only," LeBruno said. "A lot of people had to stand back and watch the big screen because there were so many people crowded around to watch."

The grand prize winner was Josh Birks, who scored an 85.5 in the short go, LeBruno said. He was the only bull rider in the short go after competing in the long go, making him the winner of the entire event. "He was pretty happy to come to Perdue and I'm pretty sure they'll be back."

One of the biggest draws of the night was the half-time show - wild pony racing. "That was definitely a highlight of our event," LeBruno said. "We had five teams come out and two teams actually rode the ponies.

"Because I am involved in 4-H, a couple of them were actually my 4-H kids from local clubs that I had just watched them show their calves," she smiled. "They came out and did such a good job. They are excited to come back (next year). Many people talked about that and said that made the show. We will definitely have that back if we have the bull riding again."

She said although they wanted a large crowd to attend, it was surprising to see so many people at the event. Since it was well-attended, LeBruno said they may make some changes next year. "We're going to make the ring bigger, so we can add more seating (and) can accommodate the bigger crowd that we had," she said. "We did expect to have lots of people ... We hoped for 400, but we didn't know that many would come. "It was good to see but definitely plans to have more seating for next year and make it bigger and better."





### **Perdue Bull Riding**

This is the first time a bull riding event has been held in Perdue. LeBruno said there used to be a bull riding event in Asquith, another small community in the area. "It was a very successful event -- unfortunately, they lost their volunteer power. They ran out of people and time," she said. "We were approached by the same contractor. He is local and his name is Blain Fisen.

"He really wanted to see it happen because he is a local guy as well and was happy to do something in his community," she added. "He helped us

through everything and actually helped us find some sponsorship, too."

The event was a huge success, thanks to the support of the organizing committee, the volunteers, the Perdue Ag Society, the bull riders and the spectators, she



explained. "So many people were very happy to be there and really complemented us on what a great event and how well run it was," LeBruno said. "That is positive and encouraging for us as committee members to look at doing this event next year." They hope to make the bull riding an annual event. "We are obviously looking at the finances and how everything happened, but as you know the first year is normally more expensive," LeBruno said. "We'll work out all the kinks and hopefully be able to bring this event back."

# **Premises Identification Program**

# Ministry of Agriculture Premises Identification Program

Thanks to the executive of SAASE, it allowed me the opportunity to speak to many of you at your annual convention in Moose Jaw last February. I spoke about Premises Identification and our then soon to be running database.

Well ... the system is now functioning. Many of you have already enrolled. I am inviting those who have not yet enrolled, the invitation to sign up. You can do this in a number of ways, you can print off a paper copy and send it in, or you can go directly to the database and enter your information. I will even make the offer, you just need to phone me directly and I will enroll you over the phone.

The primary purpose of a PID database is to assist the Chief Veterinary Officer when producers (or Ag Societies, vet clinics, abattoirs, etc.) need to be contacted in the event of a disease outbreak or other form of emergency. The information within the PID database is used along with other data within Canada's traceability system to more quickly prevent the spread of an animal disease which in turn will reduce the cost to the industry and the economy and assist with market access.

There is no cost to enroll and it takes about 10 minutes to apply. How to apply:

- 1. Go to our website http://www.agriculture.gov.sk.ca/PID and
- 2. Print a paper copy of the 'Premise Identification Account Application' and the address is on the application, or
- 3. Enroll yourself directly 'Saskatchewan PID web portal', or
- 4. Phone me directly at 306-787-7702 to enroll.

Either way you choose, I will be more than happy to assist you.
